2. Live within your income.
3. Don't argue.
4. Don't nag.
5. Work together as partners.
6. Continue the same courtesies used during courtship.

11. Make religion an integral part of your daily life.

He has been vice-chairman of the National Association of Inter-group Relations Officials, and is presently vice-chairman of the Chicago Division of the American Civil Liberties Union. He is also a regular contributor to national magazines.
