Jewelry Collector To Tell Woman's Club Of Adventures

Mildred Othmer Peterson will speak on the fascinating subject "Adventures in Collecting Foreign Jewelry" at the regular afternoon meeting of the Highland Park Woman's Club next Tuesday, April 4. This will be the last full day of both morning and afternoon sessions of the current club year. The day will begin with the Collectors' Study Group at 10:30 a.m. and continue at 12:45 with a Book Review.

At 2 p.m. after the brief business is concluded, Mrs. Sidney Frisch, president, will turn the meeting over to Mrs. Garfield Day who will introduce Mrs. Peterson, traveler, writer, lecturer, and librarian. Approximately 20 members of the Club will model jewelry to illustrate the speaker's subject, "Adventures in Collecting Foreign Jewelry". Mrs. Peterson speaks on subjects pertaining to her many travels: the people and handicrafts, but particularly of the jewelry of the various countries she has visited.

Educated at the Universities of Nebraska, Iowa, Northwestern and Chicago, her travels have taken her to every state in our own country, to Alaska, Canada, Mexico, Cuba, Central and South America and on several trips to Europe and to Russia. Mildred Othmer Peterson is a writer of wide experience having contributed to newspapers, magazines, the American Library Association, and such encyclopedias as the Americana, New International, Britannica, World Book, American Educator. She is well-known also as an editor, radio broadcaster, and writer of a syndicated column of

book news, reviews and travel notes. She is associated with organizations of the following caliber: National Association of Travel Officials, National Society of Women Geographers, Art Institute and Council of Social Agencies.



She will bring with her hundreds of pieces of Jewelry from her collection which includes lapis lazuli from Russia, ceramic jewelry from Europe, Finnish jewelry from the time of the Crusades, jade necklaces from China, coral from Japan, carved antique ivory pins from Alaska, modern silver pieces from the Scandinavian countries, toe rings and turquoise from India, gold-filigree from the Far East, old Italian mosaics, earrings from Egypt, butterfly-wing ornaments from Brazil, Guatemalan Wedding chains, and a wedding ring from Lapland—to name a few.

At 10:30 a.m. the Collectors' Study Group will present Mr. Robert G. Robinson who will speak

on "The Use of Antiques in Decorating". He will be introduced by Mrs. Mason Smith, Chairman of the Group. Mr. Robinson, a Highland Park, associated with Alden's has a knowledge of all phases of the Antique business so unique, so all-encompassing that his talk should be unusually interesting and the Group is proud to present him to bring to a close their 1949-50 series of talks on Antiques. Mr. Robinson just returned from a buying trip to Europe, states that many of the large estates are being closed and collections are being brought to this country in ever increasing numbers.

Anyone interested in learning how to decorate with antiques is urged to attend Mr. Robinson's inspiring lecture. There will be the usual period when the speaker will be glad to answer any questions concerning antiques or their use in the home.

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Viezbicke Of Lincoln School Honored By Midwest Conference

Vincent Viezbicke, physical education instructor at Lincoln school, Highland Park, was selected by the Midwest Physical Education conference, including the states of Illinois, Wisconsin, Indiana, Michigan, Ohio and West Virginia, to present a series of "sure-fire" games at the convention which was held in the Sherman hotel, Chicago, Wednesday, Thursday and Friday. Twenty-five pupils from the fifth and sixth grades of Lincoln presented a demonstration Thursday morning.

"Sure-fire" games are lead-up games played in the intermediate grades and are used to teach the skills employed in major sports including baseball, basketball, soccer, speedball and volleyball. In some instances, the "sure-fire" games are a combination of two or three major sports activities, such as V-B-B (volleyball, baseball and basketball).

The game was originated by Viezbicke and was published in the November, 1948, issue of the Journal for Health Physical Education and Recreation, a national magazine for the profession.
