Following the meeting, Bruce League know this? Krasberg, organizing chairman of the League, announced that almost 700 voters had enrolled in the Voters' League in a little over a week in response to a membership invitation mailed to the residents of District 108.

Krasberg stated that this is without the final report of the precinct chairmen, who are accepting membership applications in each section of the district, and it is expected that the total may reach 1,000 members in the near future.

"It is particularly significant that these are paid-up members and that the rate of enrollment has been nearly 100 a day," Krasberg said.
