Leaf From A California Diary

Monday . . . Low fog till ten . . . Hazy sunshine (smog) till 2 p.m. then low fog. At 11 a.m. the fire department came with the usual siren serenade, plus a chorus of howling dogs. The fire was on the other side of the canyon, but I kept my nose plastered to the window until I saw the last of the fire department on its way home.

Tuesday . . . 1:30; sirens, again. I found a huge tree had fallen at the intersection of a three-street crossing. Power and light wagons had been called to clear the street and replace torn wires.

Wednesday . . . Low fog and smog during mid-day. Just before noon the fire department came "sirenating" along to a house just below us where smoke was puffing out of the second-story windows. All clear in 20 minutes.

Thursday . . . More fog and hazy sunshine. The sirens again. The turns were sharp here in the hills, and a driver didn't make the grade. He went over the curbing in a complete summersault, 159 feet, to the street below. Taken to the hospital he was found to be uninjured. He was arrested as a drunken driver.

Friday . . . last day of fog and smog. Just as the fog lifted, came the music of sirens. The marshall came first, followed by four trucks to the end of the canyon, half a mile away. We found that some fatty substance, placed in an incinerator, had leaked out into some bushes setting them on fire. Immediately the inspector came along, examining every incinerator in the canyon. With summer on the way they have to be very careful, as we are in the Fire Area.

Navy Accepts Non-High School Graduates

Non-high school graduates are now eligible for enlistment in the U.S. Navy. Any man between the ages 17-31 who is physically, morally, and mentally fit will be accepted for immediate enlistment according to an announcement made by Chief Petty Officer Pogmann of the Navy Recruiting Station in P.O. Bldg., Waukegan, Ill.

Previously the Navy put a premium on high school graduate enlistments, because of low monthly quotas. Now unlimited quotas have caused the local recruiter to eliminate a waiting list and accept non-high school graduates for immediate enlistment.

Non-high school graduates may attend Navy Trade Schools if they are ambitious and can pass entrance examinations.

The Friends of the Library are sponsoring this music series which will be illustrated by piano, records and other musical instruments. There is no charge.

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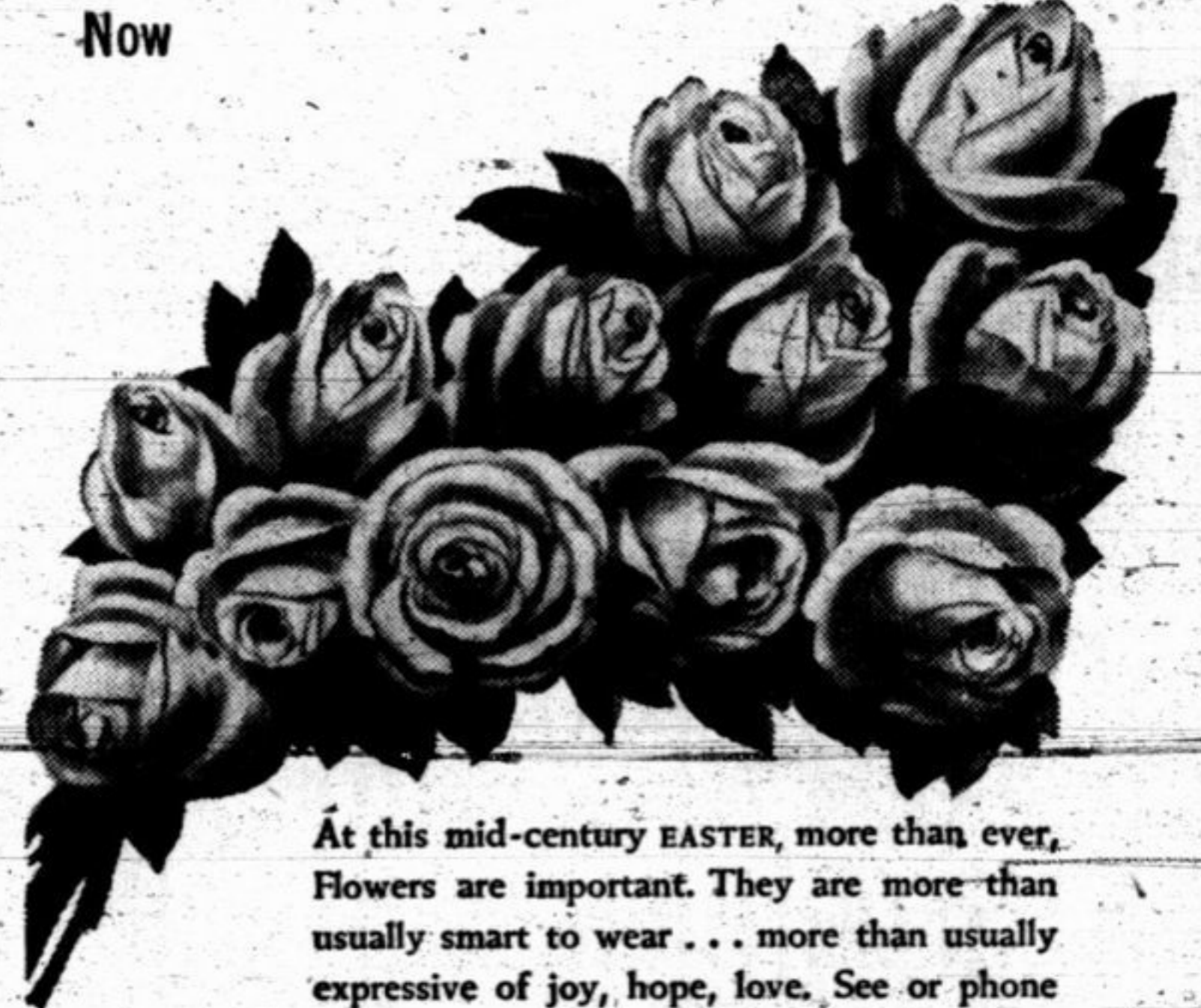


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
