(c) The law further provides that a permanent abode is necessary to constitute residence.

The School Code further pro vides that all ballots used at elections to the board of education must remain in charge of the judges of the election. When the voter appears in the polling place, one of the judges must give the voter a ballot on the back of which judge. The voter marks his ballot by a cross mark in the proper must fold the ballot so as to conceal the cross marks thereon and deposit it in the ballot box without undue delay. The voters cannot vote any ballot except the ballot received from the judges of the election. If a voter declares to the judges that he cannot read the English language or is physically disabled, so as to be unable to mark his ballot, he may request the two judges of the election to assist him in the marking of his ballot as he directs. Under no circumstances, however, may the voter or the judges remove the ballot from the polling place for
