League Candidate Issues Statement On Election

Loirets B. Knouff, the District 108 Voters' League candidate for president of the board of education, today issued the following statement relative to the recent school board election:

"On behalf of the other Voters' League candidates and myself, I wish to assure the school board of our co-operation in working for the program which the Voters' League initiated and in which the newly elected board members and the remaining board members concurred during the last week of the campaign—consolidation of the school districts, tax economy, and a redetermination of the will of the voters before any school construction program is undertaken.

"We are highly gratified that more than 3,000 people voted in the election, and we believe this to be one of the largest votes ever cast in a school election in Highland Park. It is since the organization of the Voters' League that this healthy interest in school affairs has developed.

"The League this year provided the voters with an opportunity to actually select their school board members at the polls and is content to abide by the result. This is the American Way.

"The Voters' League is now ready to carry forward its policy of formulating and proposing constructive plans for school improvement. The immediate objective is school district consolidation and this can only be accomplished by working out a formula which will make consolidation mutually advantageous to the several districts.

"The first obstacles to be overcome are the high tax rate in District 108 and the problem of the intermediate school. It would be futile to undertake consolidation until a plan for overcoming such obstacles is developed.

"The idea of consolidation is one thing and a workable plan for achieving it is quite another. To precipitate a decision without the proper preparation through co-operative discussion and planning with the other districts would be the quickest way to forever prevent consolidation. It is our sincere hope that a workable plan can be arrived at within the next six months.

"The Voters' League feels sure that the school board will give due consideration to the fact that the League was supported in last week's election by almost half of the voters. To the end that we may have a higher standard of education, the Voters' League pledges its full co-operation."

Quality Of Ravinia Pavilion Acoustics Proved By Tests

Unique tests made on a scale model of the new Ravinia Festival pavilion have determined that the acoustics will be of the finest both from an audience standpoint and from that of the orchestra members as well, according to Howell W. Murray, Ravinia Festival chairman.

The tests were conducted by scientists of the Armour Research Foundation of Illinois Institute of Technology and employed ultrasonic principles in one of the first such studies made in Chicago. Dr. Howard C. Hardy, supervisor of acoustics and vibrations research was in charge of the test.

Several minor changes were made in the original pavilion plans in order to meet the exacting requirements of fine acoustics, Mr. Murray said. These included modifications of the sides of the stage and elimination of acoustical material in the roof.

The new pavilion, which will cost \$350,000 when completed, will be ready for the opening of the 1950 season on Tuesday evening, June 27. Of the total \$350,000 remains to be raised, according to Mr. Murray. Contributions either large or small are welcomed and may be sent to the Ravinia Festival office, 231 S. LaSalle Street, Chicago.

May Auditions To Determine Michaels Memorial Award

Auditions to be held in Chicago the last week in May, under the direction of the Ravinia Festival association, will determine the winners of the Michaels Memorial Music award, established to commemorate the late Mr. and Mrs. Joseph E. Michaels of Highland Park, who were killed Feb. 19, 1949, in an air collision over Coventry, England.

The winning contestant will be entitled to a personal appearance on radio station WGN in June, a \$1,000 scholarship award and a solo performance at Ravinia park in the summer of 1951. Anyone over 18 years of age, amateur or professional, may compete.

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
