**YWCA Names Judges For Photo Contest Thursday, May 25**

The Annual Photo contest will take place at the local "Y" on Thursday, May 25th, instead of on May 20th, as was recently announced. This will enable the contestants to obtain better "shots" of the early spring beauty.

**Christian Science Lecture**

At no time in history have men and women been in greater need of compassion than they are today, Ralph Castle, Christian Science lecturer, told an audience in the Church edifice of the First Church of Christ Scientist, Highland Park, recently.

"Compassion, as Christ Jesus displayed it," he said, "conveys ineffable tenderness. It is more than ordinary pity, kindness, or mercy. It is a deep desire to do good to others, a feeling which preceded the actual physical healing. Today," said Mr. Castle, "this same sense of compassion toward our fellow beings is requisite to Christian Science healing. On page 367 of her textbook, 'Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures,' Mary Baker Eddy, the Discoverer, Founder, and Leader of Christian Science, writes, 'The tender word and Christian encouragement of an invalid, pitiful patience with his fears and the removal of them, are better than hecatombs of gushing theories, stereotyped borrowed speeches, and the doling of arguments, which are but so many parodies on legitimate Christian Science, aflame with divine Love.' And on page 365 she states, 'If the Scientist reaches his patient through the Love, healing work will be accomplished at one visit, and the disease will vanish into its native nothingness like dew before the morning sunshine.'"

The theme of the lecture is definitely woven in its title, "Christian Science: Its Reinstatement of Primitive Christianity and Spiritual Healing," for Mr. Castle contended that the application of the teachings of Jesus in our daily lives is the sole purpose of Christian Science, and this, he said, of course includes healing the sick by spiritual means, or by prayer, and regenerating the sinful.

The lecturer said he wished to devote the time at his disposal to discussing two of the Christly characteristics, or qualities of Jesus, in connection with his subject, namely, compassion, and Christ Jesus' realization of inseparability from God.

"In Christian Science," Mr. Castle explained, "the original distinction is retained which existed between the name Jesus and the word Christ. Jesus was a man's name and is still used in some countries. Christ was a title meaning the Anointed, or the Messiah. Originally, the Master was referred to as Jesus, the Christ, but gradually the article was dropped until he became commonly spoken of as Jesus Christ or Christ Jesus.

"Jesus was actually God's representative on earth, doing nothing, as he said, in his own power or strength, but accomplishing all things—healing the sick, raising the dead, regenerating sinners, even bringing his own body back from the tomb—through the knowledge of man's at-onement with the Father, the divine Spirit, with which he was endowed without measure. On page 482 of 'Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures,' Mrs. Eddy writes: 'Jesus was the highest human concept of the perfect man. He was inseparable from Christ, the Messiah,—the divine idea of God outside the flesh.' Jesus was inseparable from Christ, because he knew through spiritual perception that he was inseparable. And herein lies an important factor in the teachings of Christian Science and in its healing efficacy.

**Roosevelt College Offers Scholarships**

Leading June graduates of Highland Park High School are among those who will be eligible to compete for 19 full-tuition one-year scholarships offered by Roosevelt College in Chicago, Edward J. Sparling, president of the College, announced today.
