

Town Meeting Will Debate Peace Plans At Northwestern U.

If there is a way to peace, North Shoreites may be among the first to learn about it.

Using the age-old tradition of the town meeting, more than two dozen civic organizations from shore towns will sponsor free-swinging debate on peace problems at Northwestern University's Technological Auditorium on Friday evening, April 28th.

An opening talk by Raymond Gram Swing will set off an audience discussion of various peace proposals now before Congress. Jerry Voorhis, former Congressman from California now a resident of Winnetka, will act as moderator of the open meeting.

"It is our prayer that from this meeting will come much more attention to this subject by every citizen," an initial committee of sponsors announced, giving as their aim to focus attention "on a solution to the great crisis of the world."

Among individuals issuing the call for the town meeting were Dr. Payson Wild, Jr.; Rabbi Edgar Siskin; Mrs. Ernest Fremont Tittle, Irving Pflaum, Dr. Ovid Fischbach, Bishop Wallace B. Conking, and Dr. Carol Daugherty.

The April 28 meeting will be a sequel to a January debate which drew more than a thousand people to hear Senator Paul Douglas and question him on peace plans, according to organizing chairman Richard E. Lassar. Since the first event, a dozen more organizations have joined the list of sponsors, he said.

Among sponsor organizations is the League of Women Voters of Highland Park.

Playing errorless ball the Highland Park and New Trier high school baseball teams clashed in a Suburban League contest, the first one for each team, Tuesday afternoon on the Winnetka field with the home team taking the contest by a 2 to 1 score.

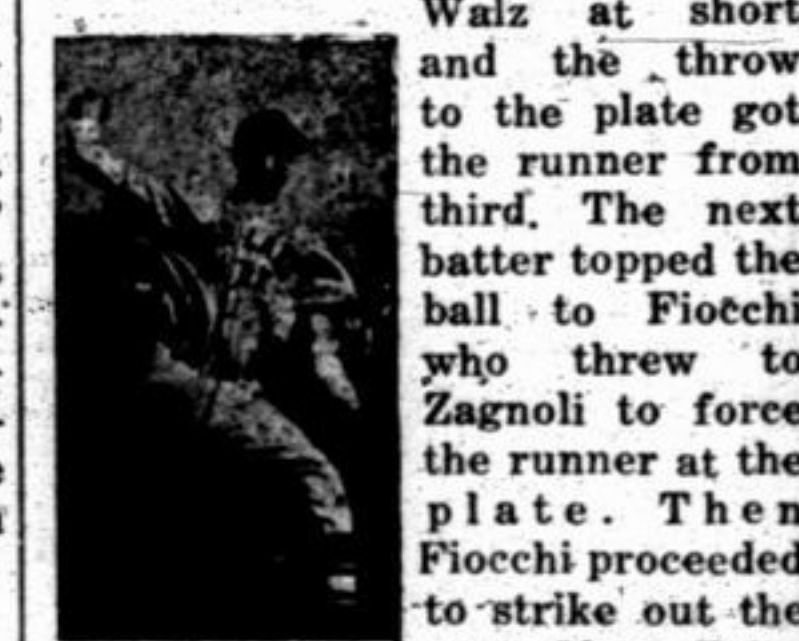
The Blue and White club, with no real practice tilts under its belt, showed much promise even in defeat. They had only a couple of games, played in cold weather and mud, prior to taking on the New Trier Green Wave.

New Trier is probably one of the strongest in the league again this year. In 1948 they won 14 and lost 0 in league competition and last year came up with a 12 won 2 lost count for the crown. In many circles they have been picked to take the title again this year.

Little Giant Fielding Good The fielding of Coach George Grover's Highland Park team was flawless and only their inability to hit the ball, due to the lack of practice in batting, caused the defeat.

Both pitchers did a fine job with Bob Fiochi giving up 6 hits and fanning 4 in his first start of the season for the Blue and White. Anderson, the New Trier hurler struck out 8 while giving up 2 hits.

New Trier got off to an early lead by taking all three places in the high jump and winning the shot put but Bob Guentz, Danny Seitz and Pete Walker put the Blue and White right back in the running with victories in the high and low hurdles, the pole vault and 50 yd. dash, respectively.

With 2 events remaining, the broad jump and the relay, the score stood New Trier 40, H.P. 32. Then came the rally as Guentz, Walker and Talano teamed up to tie down all three places in the broad jump and a 41 to 40 lead which they widened as Schuster joined the trio in winning the relay.

Bob Guentz was high point man with 17 1/2 as he won three events, placed third in the 50 yd. dash and anchored the winning relay.

Johnny Weissmuller, the tree climbing idol as Tarzan to many an American kid for years and the holder of 67 world's swimming records, will bring his talent-loaded musical water and stage "Watercade of 1950" revue to the Chicago Arena May 3 through May 14.
