Deadline for Applications Of Veterans For **State Bonus**

A bulletin received by Ray Suzzi, post service officer of the Highwood post, American Legion, from the Veterans Information Service, gives the following deadlines for the state bonus: Connecticut, June 30, 1951; Delaware, January 1, 1951; Illinois, June 30, 1951; Indiana, January 1, 1951; Iowa, December 31, 1950; Michigan, March 20, 1951; Minnesota, December 31, 1950; North Dakota, February 17, 1954; Ohio, June 30, 1950; Pennsylvania, July 1, 1950 and South Dakota, June 30, 1950. Veterans who enlisted from any of the above states, and at the time declared it their home state are entitled to the respective bonus. Mr. Suzzi has some of the forms, and anyone desiring assistance may call him for an appointment.

The state of Washington also pays a bonus. Veterans living in that state may receive their application blanks from their service officer. Veterans living outside of the state must write the State Auditor, Olympia, Washington, Mr. Suzzi further stated.

Service must have been between December 7, 1941, and September 2, 1945; honorably discharged; citizen or resident at least one year before entering service. Next of kin of men who died in service; unremarried widow, surviving children or dependent parents are eligible to apply. Evidence of identity and serv-

ice must be submited with the application and a full size photostat or photograph of discharge is required. Also, the form must be signed by an acquaintance, in presence of a notary public, certifying that the veteran was. citizen or resident of Washington during the time claimed in the application.

The Chorus will present a comprehensive program of numbers. Payments will be \$10 per month The soloist will be Miss Susan


