Veteran's Children Aided By Poppy Day Contributions

Children left in need by the death or disability of a veteran father will be among those who benefit from Poppy day, to be observed here May 20, by wearing the poppies in honor of the war dead.

How the wearing of a poppy helps some child of a veteran was described by Mrs. Arthur Cervetti, president of Highwood Unit No. 501, American Legion auxiliary, which is sponsoring Poppy day in Highwood.

"Funds from Poppy day contributions enable our Auxiliary Unit to be ready to come to the rescue of any child of a veteran we find in need," Mrs. Cervetti explained. "We believe that no child should suffer because his father served for America, and we are carrying forward constantly an effective child welfare program to aid children of veterans, as well as to improve conditions for all children.

"When a person drops a coin into the box carried by an Auxiliary Poppy day worker, he is helping us care for these innocent little victims of war. When death, disability or other war-borne causes break up the family of a veteran, it is the children who suffer most. Wearing a poppy is a way to help provide for their immediate needs and give them a fair start in life."

Mrs. Cervetti will be among the Auxiliary volunteers who will be on the streets here all day on Poppy day offering memorial poppies to be worn in honor of the war dead and receiving contributions for the Auxiliary's work for disabled veterans and needy children of veterans.
