The Brooklyn bridge is still being sold, and people are buying gold bricks or the equivalent.

Neither do we think the Republicans can gain any ground by trying to outpromise such a champion promiser.

However, the program of the so-called "Democratic party" is as full of holes as a Swiss cheese, and we think a careful explanation of those holes might produce results-if the explanation is simple enough not to need further explanation and if it is emphasized, repeated, repeated and repeated again at all political levels, starting with the precinct and working on up.

We don't think it possible to win against Truman -simply by telling the people that he can't give them something for nothing. We think he can be beaten if each promise is taken apart, point by point and the impossibility of keeping it is clearly shown.

With that accomplished, the first half of the job would be done. The second half would consist of a practical platform of pledges with a thorough explanation showing why and how each of the promises making it could and would be fulfilled.



The gala opening night (Tuesday, June 27) program for the 15th Ravinia Festival season, and new soloist for its summer schedule were announced Tuesday, May 16, at the annual kickoff luncheon for the Ravinia Festival coupon book sales campaign in the Casino Club.

Eugene Ormandy, conductor of the Philadelphia Symphony chestra will conduct the first concert in the new \$350,000 Ravinia pavilion. For the occasion he has chosen to present, with the Chicago Symphony Orchestra, the following music: The Bach-Ormandy "Passacaglia and Fugue, C. Minor;" the Beethoven "Symphony No. 8;" and Brahms "Sym-

phony No. 1." The new soloist for the fifteenth season is Menahem Pressler, 22-year-old pianist from Tel-Aviv, Palestine who won the Debussy \$1,000 prize in San Francisco in 1946. He will replace on the program Byron Janis, pianist, originally announced as soloist for the July 27 and July 30 concerts under the direction of William Steinberg. Illness will keep Janis from filling his Ravinia engagement.
