Red Cross Home Nursing Classes To Open May 22

How to keep the summer bed patient comfortable will be stressed in Red Cross home nursing classes which will open late in May, according to Mrs. Estelle W. Blatt, director, Chicago Chapter Red Cross Home Nursing Dept.

Six lessons in the home care of the sick will teach students how to give a cooling bedbath, administer an alcohol backrub, and change the patient's position as a guard against prickly heat. They will learn how to move the patient from one side of the bed to the other without straining themselves. They also will be shown how to make a bed with someone in it, recognize the common symptoms of illness, and improvise sickroom facilities from articles normally found in the home.

Classes in the home care of the sick will open in Room 404, 529 S. Wabash Ave., on Monday, May 22. One group will meet from 1:30 p.m. to 3:30 p.m., and a second from 6:30 p.m. to 8:30 p.m., every Monday and Thursday until six sessions are completed.

Two courses in mother and baby care will meet at Red Cross headquarters on Wednesdays and Fridays, beginning May 24, one from 2:00 p.m. to 4:00 p.m. and another from 6:30 p.m. to 8:30 p.m. The training, which covers 12 class hours, stresses pre-natal care and the training and care of the infant.

There is no charge for Red Cross training. Students may enroll by phoning WAbash 2-7850, Ext. 64.

Benson also placed second in the shot put.

Timmy Weinfeld picked up two fourths in the 100-yard dash and broad jump, and Tom Glick placed third in the 200 and fifth in the 400 yard dash.

The last big meet for the Frosh-Soph will be Saturday, May 27, when they will enter the Suburban League meet at Evanston.

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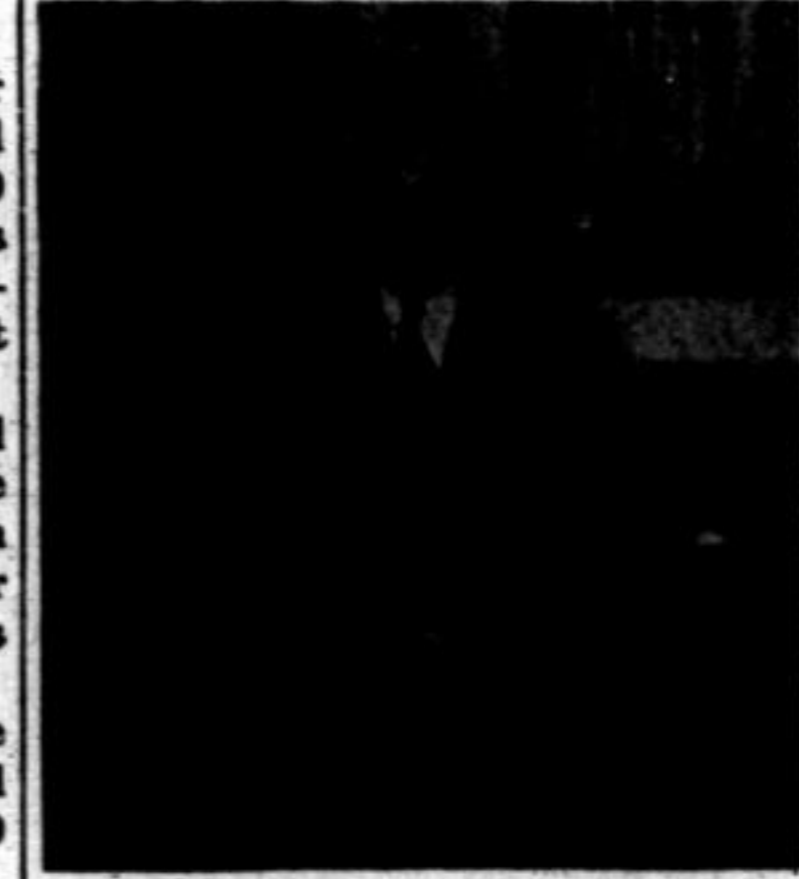

Highland Park has much to be proud of as three of her local cindermen came through with fine performances last Saturday at the District meet, held on the Evanston high school oval, by qualifying themselves for the 56th annual State Track and Field meet which will be held next week end at University of Illinois in Champaign.

Tom Swift was the first of the Blue and White to score as he came home fifth in the 440-yard run with a time of :52.8 to better the qualifying time for the quarter mile of :53.4. This was the best performance of the year for the slim Deerfield speedster who has been on the sick or injured list most of the season and who only of late has been making a great comeback to try and match his peak of condition which sent him down state last year while only a sophomore.

To keep Tom company down state will be Big Bob George and Phil Dorough. Both of these boys qualified by leaping 5 feet 8 1/2 inches in the high jump to tie with three other athletes for the first place honors. In the flip for medals, Highland Park's luck held true with the lanky Phil Dorough getting the first award and Bob George, the sophomore sensation, getting the runner-up medal.

The three boys will leave at the close of school Thursday for the trip to Champaign with Coach Mark Panther who will drive down. With them will go the good luck wishes from the people of Highland Park.
