Native Of India To Speak At Wesley Methodist

Miss Sarojini Macwan of India will be heard at the Wesley Methodist church, Highwood avenue and Everts place, Highwood, Sunday, May 28 both at the Church School and the 11:00 services. Her subject for the morning worship will be "The Church of India."

Miss Macwan knows the problems of the American missionaries among her people. In her childhood her great grandfather was the village medicine man, known throughout the village as the "Devil Driver" until he accepted Christianity. When that cured her parents were excommunicated by the other villagers. It was then that her father assumed the name "Macwan" from a Christian storekeeper who had befriended them in time of trouble.

The speaker has received de-

grees from Isabelle Thoburn college, Lucknow college and the college at Jululpore, India. Her purpose in coming to this country was to enroll in Garrett Biblical Institute and to receive an M. A. in sociology. She is interested primarily in the work of the church among her people in the many rural centers that are in her father's district.
