The Highland Park 16 inch softball league sponsored by the Playground and Recreation Department played its initial games of the season last Thursday and Friday evenings at Sunset Park. This season marks the 7th successive year of league play. Popularity of the 16 inch brand of ball keeps increasing from the player's as well as the spectator's standpoint. Back in 1944 when the league was organized, it was hard to field 4 teams. This year a total of 9 teams will take part in the sport.

The Moose, after a lapse of 6 years, have entered two teams in the league this season. They had one of the 4 teams in the original league; the others were Elm Place, the Elks, and B'nai B'rith. The league was formed as an old timers league, and players had to be 30 years-old or older to be eligible to play. Today there is no age limit, the only restriction is that all but 3 members of each team's roster must be residents of Highland Park.

It is still early to determine the relative strength of the teams, but judging by past experience, it can be said that when all teams are at full strength it will be a nip and tuck race all the way with no team having a decided edge.

Last year's champions, the Fells Clottiers, managed by Leo LaRuda, are back to try and retain their title. 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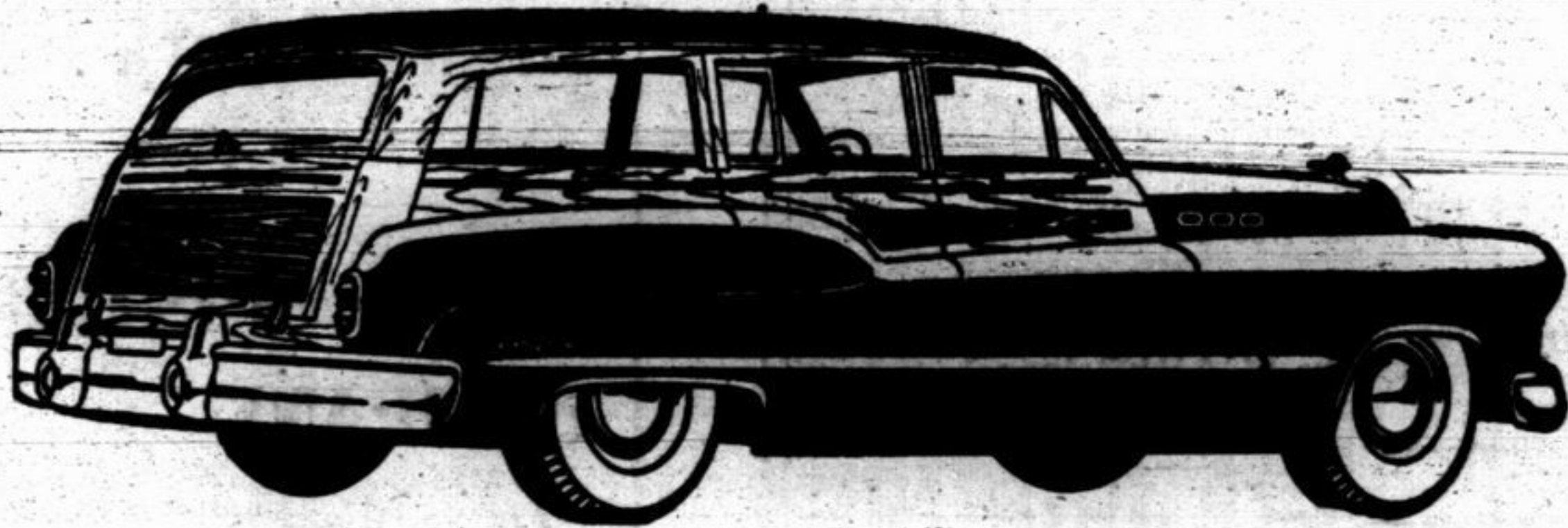
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
