Memorial Days

There were bands, parades, flags, speeches; and sincere tribute was paid to thousands of our dead last Tuesday—those who had died in war. By Tuesday p.m. night there were nearly 500 more dead—dead who had not died on battlefields, but who, nonetheless, were just as dead as any hero even though there was nothing heroic about their deaths.

About three hundred of them died in auto accidents. Some 70 had drowned, and about a hundred more had died in miscellaneous accidents.
