When the final figures are tabulated, it is expected that the total will exceed \$27,000. Eleven of the 17 communities that participated in the drive have gone over the top already, and four or five more will join them before the books are closed. Highwood, with Mrs. Ralph E. Pottker as chairman, was among the leaders with 136 per cent. Highland Park also passed the 100 per cent mark.

land Park-Ravinia Center of Infant Welfare celebrating its twenty-five years of service on Friday, May 26, at the Moraine Hotel. Individual table arrangements of silver 25's and spring flowers carried out the anniversary theme.

Against the stage background of a huge silver 25, Mrs. John R. Kies served as commentator for the presentation of a typical sewing-luncheon by the Junior group. The cast included Mesdames John P. Andrews, Jr., Donald H. Dennett, Hilding F. Hendrickson, Stewart Johnston, Warner G. Smoot, Norman Vance, Jr., Melvin G. Barker and George D. Harrison.

A telephone monologue was presented by Mrs. T. V. McDavitt. This represented a member due at noon at an infant welfare station for volunteer work in baby-weighing and record keeping. Her morning becomes complicated and hectic when measles symptoms are noticed when her own youngsters come to breakfast, the baby "sitter" fails her, and no one can substitute for her as volunteer.

Smoot, junior president, emphasized the two-fold purpose of the recently established Infant Welfare nursery school located in the Jane Addams housing project—namely, to care for pre-school children needing help in making social adjustments, and provide practical experience for nurses visiting the homes of Infant Welfare cases. After previewing these problems, they are better qualified to help solve them. Two case histories were cited—one, a child attending nursery school who is blind, and another coming from blind parents. Infant Welfare is working to help overcome a halting gait acquired by copying the walk of blind parents. Behavior and eating problems are also overcome.
