When 13th District GOP leaders meet tomorrow night (Friday) to select a candidate to fill the vacant place on the ballot left by the death of Ralph E Church, we don't think they could do better than to pick Brig. Gen. William H. Wilbur.

"The decrease in School District No. 108 is caused by a lower school rate of .269, the town rate of .035, county rate of .002, and park rate of .002. The High school rate increased 181/2 cents; Highland Park Mosquito Abatripent rate increased .001 and the City of Highland Park rate increased .012-a net difference of .11 per \$100. The decrease of .031/2 noted in the township rate is accounted for by the fact that the Town Board did not make a levy for the general fund because of the surplus on hand caused by excess earnings of the township collector and the economy in the office of the sup-
