ORDINANCE NO. 50-0-70

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF HIGHWOOD:

Section 1: Hereafter, all vehicles parked on Greenbay Road from the south city limits to the north city limits shall be parked! parallel to the curb. It shall be unlawful to park a vehicle on Greenbay Road at an angle tothe curb at any time. The Chief of Police, with the assistance of the Street Department, shall erect appropriate warning signs along Greenbay Road.

Section 2: Whenever any person, firm or corporation is found guilty of violating any provision of this ordinance, the violator shall be subject to a penalty of not more than Twenty-five Dollars (\$25.00).


Everybody looked at me.
