LEGAL

ORDINANCE NO. 50-0-70

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF HIGHWOOD:

Section 1: Hereafter, all vehicles parked on Greenbay Road from the south city limits to the north city limits shall be parked parallel to the curb. It shall be unlawful to park a vehicle on Greenbay Road at an angle to the curb at any time. The Chief of Police, with the assistance of the Street Department, shall erect appropriate warning signs along Greenbay Road.

Section 2: Whenever any person, firm or corporation is found guilty of violating any provision of this ordinance, the violator shall be subject to a penalty of not more than Twenty-five Dollars (\$25.00).

Adolph Gieser, 614 Glenview avenue, a resident of Highland Park for over 50 years, passed away on Friday of last week at the Highland Park hospital after a brief illness.

Born in Germany, 80 years ago, he came to this country in 1893, living most of his life in Highland Park. His wife, Annie, preceded him in death four years ago.

A retired merchant, he was well-known and had many friends here. He was a member of the Gospel Chapel, Evanston, and the funeral services were conducted by a close personal friend, Mr. James Humphrey, of Chicago, at the Kelley-Spalding chapel on Monday of this week.

Surviving are a son, Windsor, and two grandchildren, of Lake Forest, and many nieces and nephews in Highland Park. Two brothers, Paul and Ernst, and one sister, Marie, a missionary, all of Highland Park, preceded him in death.

Interment was made in Memorial Park cemetery.

Born in Italy, he came to this country at the age of 20, and lived for the past 25 years in Highland Park, working as a gardener on large estates here. He was 69 years of age.

Surviving are his widow, Clara; three daughters, Mrs. Gena Morelli and Mrs. Charles Pansini of Highwood, and Mrs. Irvin Segrelet of Waukegan; a son, Raymond, of Highwood, and three grandchildren.

Funeral rites were conducted on Tuesday at St. James church for Casper J. Santi, 213 Sheridan avenue, Highwood, who succumbed on Sunday, at the St. Theresa's hospital, Waukegan, to an illness of three years.

Born in Modena, Italy, sixty-five years ago, he came to this country in 1902 with his mother, two brothers and a sister. His father met death in a mining accident in Colorado in 1894.

In 1908 he and his brothers opened a grocery store in Highwood, later moving into larger quarters and adding a bakery. From 1915 to 1931 he was also engaged in banking, real estate and insurance, and from 1933 until his death he and his sons operated a large cafe in Highwood. He was, at one time, City Collector for Highwood, and was one of the best-known and beloved leaders of Italian extraction in the Chicago area.

Surviving are his widow, Mary; two sons, Ernest J. and Casper, Jr.; two daughters, Mrs. Yolanda Benvenuti and Mrs. Virginia Bernardi; five grandchildren and a brother Sante Santi, all of Highwood.

Moonlight Dance Cruise

The famed Lake Michigan excursion ship, S. S. City of Grand Rapids, will begin its one-day across-lake trips to Michigan City, Ind., from Chicago's Michigan Avenue bridge and return on Saturday, June 24, according to an announcement by Thomas J. McGuire, president of the Cleveland and Buffalo Steamship Company operating the "Queen of the Lake."

Now being readied at its dock in Benton Harbor, Mich., the SS City of Grand Rapids will come over in the early hours of the morning of June 24 and will be received royally on this side. A number of impressive ceremonies are being planned for the occasion.

The daily trips to lovely Washington Park in Michigan City and return will begin immediately, replacing, at a greatly lower price, the excursions to Benton Harbor that have been in force for some years.

at least one day each week to drive Red Cross vehicles.

The need is great because with the onset of the summer season, the Red Cross receives additional calls to transport hospitalized servicemen and veterans to baseball games and other special events in Chicago as part of the program that has been arranged for their entertainment.

Mrs. Alfred Gemeinhardt, chairman of Chicago Chapter Red Cross motor service, points out that this volunteer activity offers a real opportunity to help brighten the days of convalescent patients at military hospitals and veterans administration installations in the Chicago area.

To qualify as a Red Cross volunteer driver, women must be between the ages of 20 and 50, be American citizens, have an Illinois state driver's license and must pass a driving skills test. They are also given a short course in first aid and traffic safety which will prove valuable in emergencies of highway and city driving.

FAN TANS ARE FUN TO MAKE



Try your hand at Fan Tans—strips of yeast-raised dough piled one on top of the other, cut and placed in greased muffin pans. Let rise until doubled, then into a moderate oven about 20 minutes. Out they come—pretty little fans, tanned just so—and off to the table piping hot.

FAN TANS (Makes 18)

- 3/4 cup milk
- 1/4 cup sugar
- 2 1/4 teaspoons salt
- 4 1/2 tablespoons shortening
- 3/4 cup lukewarm water
- 1 package active dry yeast or 1 cake yeast
- 4 1/2 cups sifted all-purpose flour

Scald milk, add sugar, salt, and shortening. Stir until dissolved. Cool to lukewarm. Put lukewarm water into a large mixing bowl. Sprinkle or crumble in yeast. Let stand until dissolved, about 10 minutes. Add lukewarm milk mixture. Stir in 2 1/4 cups of the flour. Eat until smooth. Add remaining 2 1/4 cups flour and mix until dough forms an irregular ball and comes away from sides of bowl.

Turn out on lightly floured board and knead until dough is tightly stretched, does not stick to board. Place in greased bowl and brush top lightly with melted shortening. Cover with a towel. Let rise in a warm place, free from draft, until doubled, about 1 hour and 25 minutes. Punch down with fist, pull sides into center and form into a ball. Divide into two parts. Roll out each part into an oblong about 17x10 1/2 inches and 1/4 inch thick. Brush lightly with melted margarine or butter. Cut with a sharp knife into crosswise strips 1 1/2 inches wide and pile 7 strips together. Cut crosswise into pieces 1 1/2 inches wide. Place cut-side up in greased muffin pans and cover with a towel. Let rise in a warm place, free from draft, until doubled, about 1 hour. Bake in a moderate oven, 400°, about 20 min.
