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Arenberg Promises "New Look" For Harrison Wholesale Team

Followers of the 12-inch AA Baseball League in Highland Park are not likely to recognize the "New Look" Harrison Wholesale outfit. When Manager Hank Arenberg leads his team onto the field next Tuesday night for the first league game of the season, the roster will list only three men who were active on the same date a year ago with Harrison's; last season's runner up in the league race.

Alex DeBartolo, one of the three Harrison players from last year's team who were selected for the All-Star team will again be at second or third base. Dick Therrien, a standout in the defensive department in Harrison's outfield will again be cutting down would-be base runners for the wholesalers. The third holdover from last year's team will be Bus Siegel, sensational young outfielder, who practically set the league on fire when he joined Harrison in mid-season. Young Siegel just graduated from Brasseid grammar school last week, and will probably be the youngest player in the league this year.

Among the newcomers on the team who will make their debut next Tuesday are Bob Flocchi, one of the few ball players ever to play varsity ball for the local high school while still a freshman, will see action around second base. Dino Melchiorre will be remembered by fans in this area for his fine playing for Highland Park high school and in the 16-inch league last year. Melchiorre will fill the wide-open spaces between second and third bases, long known as the hot spot in 12-inch baseball. Jerry Chambers, whom critics claimed as a standout a few years back for Northern Illinois State Teachers' College will share the catching duties with Frank Hennig, number one catcher on the Fells 12-inch team for the last four years.

If the old adage about a good pitching staff means the success or the failure of a ball club, Harrison should be at the top of the league with an excellent three man mound staff composed of Enzo Nannini, Jack Hansen, and Dale Murphy. Nannini and Hansen are no newcomers to kitten ball in Highland Park. Nannini pitched the Santi Dairy Club to second place in the AA League two seasons ago; with his famous fastball and fader. Jack Hansen, long known around this area for his fine control last pitched for the "River Rats" a free lance outfit and rolled up some impressive wins with this team. For the last two years Hansen has seen action in the Pacific Area with the Air Force where he pitched on the championship team in the Pacific last season. Dale Murphy, a newcomer to Highland Park fans, last saw pitching for the United States Navy, and at present he is now attached to the Great Lakes Base as a Chief Petty Officer.

Harrison will again put the emphasis on hitting after the way it paid off for the team last year. The wholesalers pounded opposing pitchers all over the landscape for a total of 293 runs in thirty games last season which helps explain the team's impressive record of 22 wins and only 8 losses last season.

With a little cooperation from the weatherman Harrison will hold a non-league game tonight (Thursday) at Lincoln School and another practice game Sunday night with game time at 7 p.m., in preparation for Tuesday's opener at Sunset Park.

Dads' Hot Rods To Be Shown Saturday

Old-time drivers and automobiles of the North Shore, Chicago area and midwest will gather nostalgically to relive the early motor age on Saturday at Lake Forest College campus.

More than fifty veteran cars belonging to members of the Antique Automobile Club of America will drive to the club's second annual Midwest regional "meet", piloted by fans who range from socialites to grease monkeys, and whose ages run from grandfathers to youthful descendants of pioneer motorists. A separate division will include modern sports cars.

"Many of our cars are fugitives from a museum", said George Campbell, Highland Park; AACA's Midwest Region president. "Kept in top shape and driven regularly, they are an inspiring tribute to the genius of motor builders who put half the world on wheels."

Visiting cars are expected from as far as Newark, Ohio, including a score of entries built before 1920, Campbell said. Among local drivers and antique cars entered are Everett L. Millard, Highland Park, 1920 Cunningham; George Campbell, Highland Park, 1922 Cole; Lorentz B. Knouff, Highland Park, 1926 Lancia. Modern sports cars shown will range from the American Cord and popular British MG to such exotic names as Proto Type, Lea Francis, Jaguar and Kurtiskraft. G. A. Seaverns, III, C. T. Boynton, II and Dr. Glen Harrison of Lake Forest; William F. Victor and Walden P. Weaver, Evanston; George M. Wallerich and George W. Lamberson, River Forest; E. D. Bonham, LaGrange; J. Howard Raftery, Geneva; Usher T. Coolidge, L. B. Sherman, Jr., G. N. Burns, and W. L. Rodgers, Chicago.

The meeting will be open to members and guests of the AACA, according to Campbell, and of the Sports Car Club of America. Events will begin at ten a.m. and will include a luncheon on the college grounds.

The old car fans will award prizes for best condition, most interesting models and other non-racing virtues of their aged mechanical pets. But enthusiasts will cock a knowing ear at the bark of ancient low-compression engines, Campbell predicted, and several cars present will be capable of modern-touring speeds or even race-track performance.

The meeting, the last formal gathering of the Troop until next September, consisted of a Father and Son's baseball game, which was held early in the evening, and an outdoor Court of Honor.

As far as the Scouts are concerned, the score of the baseball game can well be forgotten.
