Committee Asks Postponement of Report On Sex Education

Round table discussions on the subject of sex education in the elementary schools of District 107 were held last week by a special committee, headed by Mrs. Avery Jones.

Such a course is comparatively new in this area, Glencoe being the only school to feature such a program, and that in a limited degree. Fewer than 5 per cent of the schools in the country offer such a course.

The committee ruled that a three-hour discussion of the subject, such as was held, is entirely insufficient to enable a comprehensive report to be prepared for submitting to the Parent-Teachers association.

The committee asked, however, to be allowed to continue its work during the school year, in order to be able to contact patrons of the district, as well as other schools, with regard to their views in the matter. The committee felt that a small group is not a fair representation of the district.

For approximately 20 years Elm Place school has featured reproduction of plant and animal life, to some degree. A survey of the patrons as a whole would be advisable, the committee thought, in order to get an over-all decision on the issue.

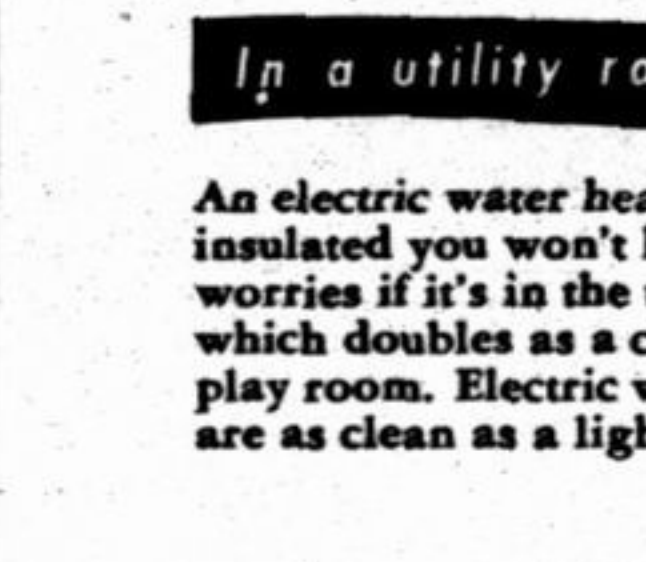
