Need More Red Cross Instructors For First Aid

A steadily developing need for first aid instructors who can teach daytime classes is reported by Chicago Chapter Red Cross and persons who would like to assist in this training program are urged to enroll for a class beginning Monday, October 9, at Red Cross headquarters, 529 S. Wabash ave.

The class will meet every Monday afternoon from 1 to 4 o'clock for a period of 15 weeks and upon completion of the course certified Red Cross first aid instructor cards will be issued to those who qualify. This will enable them to begin teaching first aid classes starting early in 1951.

For those who previously have taught Red Cross first aid classes but who have been inactive in recent years, an instructor-refresher course is being given Monday afternoon, October 9, at Red Cross headquarters. This is a three-hour course to qualify former instructors who would like to help in the training program.

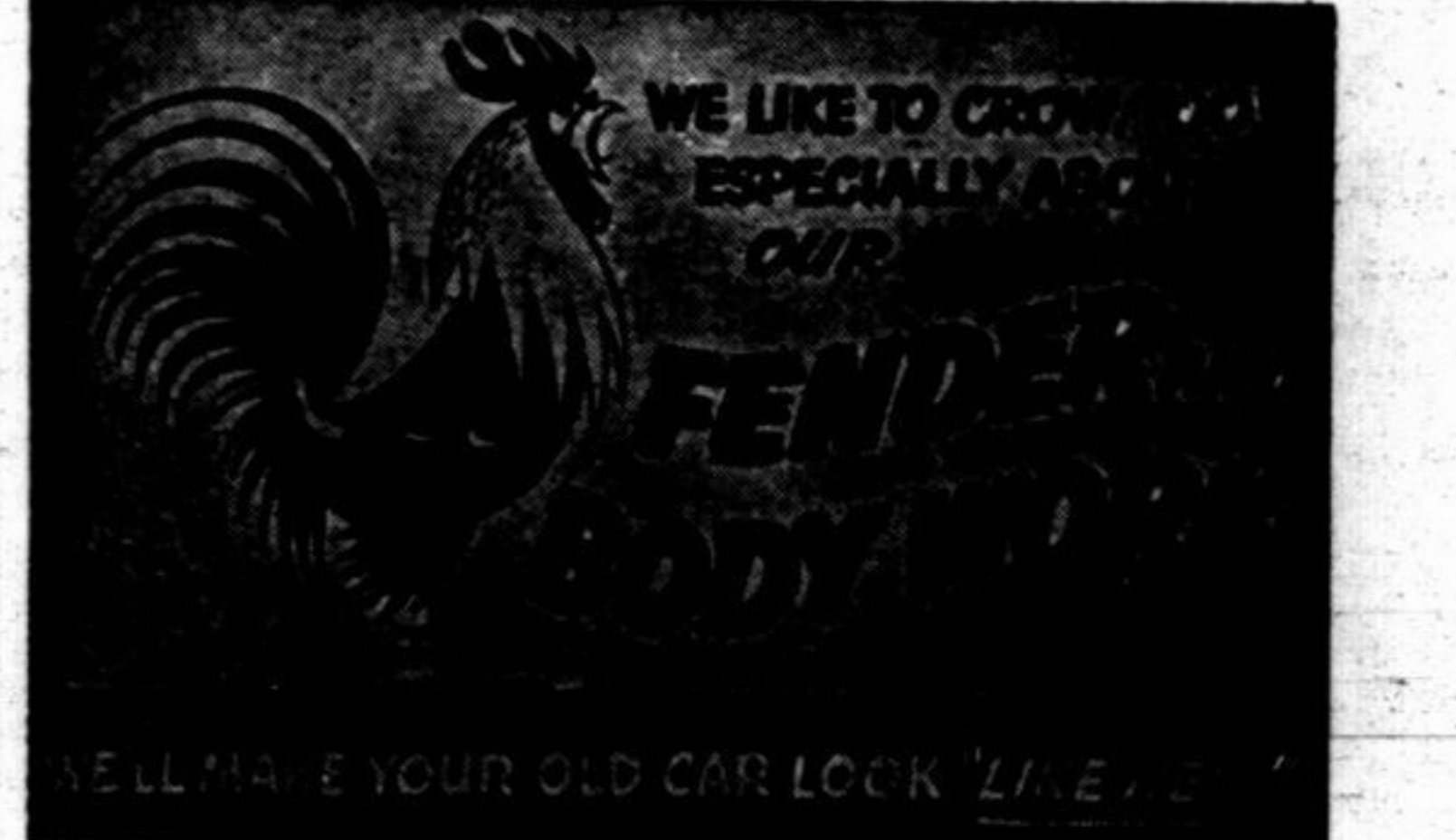
