Abandonment Of Shore Line Branch Temporarily Postponed

Postponement of Shore Line Branch abandonment proceedings during the period of unusual demands by Fort Sheridan; a speed-The Church Extension Board of ed-up rail express train schedule and a local inter-community bus service is proposed by North Shore Line officials appearing before the Illinois Commerce Commission.

> The combination rail express and local bus plan was developed by the railroad after military authorities at Fort Sheridan expressed concern to the Commission about adequacy of both freight and passenger transportation during the period of the national preparedness program.

> Under the proposed emergency plan Shore Line Branch will operate express between Waukegan, Highwood and Chicago. Passengers riding between purely local stations will be furnished a frequently scheduled modern bus service. Use of buses instead of trains by local riders will release rail cars for military needs and at the same time give a faster railexpress service for the longgerhaul civilian and military traffic. Army officers appearing officially before the Commission test-

> ified that the proposed combination train and bus service is considered adequate for the needs of the Army at this time and in the foreseeable future, assuming that a satisfactory schedule can be worked out.

Officials pointed out that during World War II when the railroad was called upon to meet unusual military transportation needs it was able to do so on many occasions only through the hiring of Elevated Lines cars, This equipment is no longer available and it is essential that something be done to release more North Shore Line rail cars for preparedness needs if the railway is to perform able to that rendered during the last war.
