Build A World Law, Vets Urge Nominees

Hailing UN police action in Korea as "a great step toward international government for peace," a group of war veterans this week called on North Shore candidates for Congress in fall elections "to pledge a fight for stronger world law as a guardian of democracy".

North Shore chapter of American Veterans Committee asked platform statements of their peace policies from Mrs. Ralph Church Republican nominee to succeed her late husband, and Thomas F Dolan, Democratic nominee for the 13th Congressional District seat, both residents of Evanston. The AVC chapter asked similar information of senatorial candidates Scott Lucas, Democratic ina cumbent, and Everett Dirksen, Republican challenger.

"The most vital job awaiting you in Congress," AVC's executive committee told the candidates, "is to set America's true goal in world affairs."


