THE PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO SECTION 2, ARTICLE XIV, OF THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS

Explanation of Proposed Amendment.

A comparison of Section 2 of Article XIV (which provides the method of adopting amendments to the Constitution) as now in force and as sought to be amended follows:

Provision of Present Constitution

Changes Made by Proposed Amendment

1. Amendments to not more than three articles may be submitted at any session.

2. Requires the votes of a majority of all electors voting at the election.

3. The form of the ballot for submitting Constitutional amendments is determined by action of the General Assembly.

1. Amendments to not more than three articles may be submitted at any session.

2. Requires the votes of a majority of those voting on the proposition, whichever is less.

3. Future amendments would be submitted either on a separate ballot or in a separate column on the ballot.

For this proposed amendment to be adopted it must receive a majority of all votes cast at the general election, November 7, 1950. Failure to vote on the proposition has the same effect as voting against it.

## Chest X-Rays Offered By Tuberculosis Assn. October 18-20

Tuberculosis can strike anyone, in any age or economic group. Since the disease is spread from person to person, one case of TB is a potential threat to everyone else in the community, said Mrs. H. S. Vaile, member of the board of directors of the Lake County Tuberculosis Association, in announcing the chest x-ray surveys to be held in Highwood and Highland Park, October 18 thru 20th.

The x-ray is the only way to discover tuberculosis early when it is easiest to cure and has no symptoms, Mrs. Vaile said. The TB association will have the Christmas Seal Mobile Chest X-ray Unit-at the grade and high schools to x-ray the positive reactors to the tuberculin test, just as they have done for several years past.

Starting at 2 p.m. on October 18, the unit will be located at the corner of Highwood and Waukegan Road in Highwood, where it will be open to the general adult population until 9 p.m.

At 9 a.m. on October 19, the nurses and other employees of the Highland Park Hospital will be x-rayed.

From 2 to 9 p.m. on October 19 and 20 the unit will be on the Northeast corner of Second and Central and will be open to the general public.

It is hoped we can have a better turn out this year than the 1028 persons x-rayed at these two locations last year, Mrs. Vaile said.
