It was while he spent his time in navigation and trouble-shooting radio and radar equipment that he made his decision for the Christian ministry.

In addition to his school work he provides for his wife and four year old son by serving as a Clerk-Carrier at the Naperville Post Office, His major work at Bethany will be with the Youth Fellowship and it can be readily predicted that the Rev. Mr. Stants with his interesting background and a likeable personality will prove to be a real leader.


