The class is open to beginners and experienced leather workers. Tools are supplies and leather may be purchased at the Center.

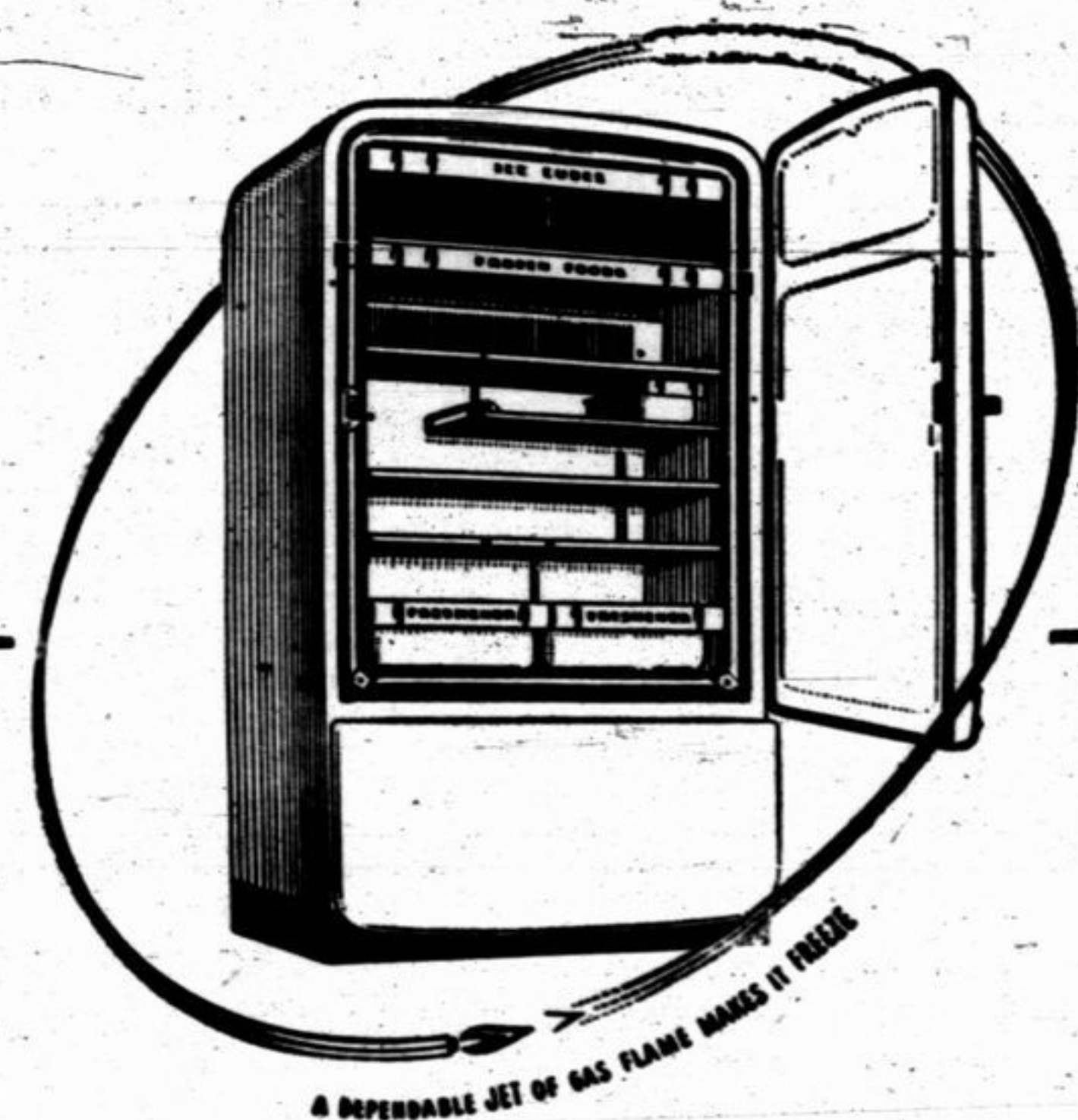
