Inter-Town Meeting Climaxes 'UN Week'

A wide range of local "United Nations Week" observances winds up next Tuesday evening with a "UN Day" inter-community peace plans forum and town meeting at Northwestern University's Tech Auditorium in Evanston.

"Our country's leadership of UN police action in Korea has dramatized American hopes for peace," said Dr. Kenneth Thompson of Evanston's First Methodist Church, heading sponsors of the event. "Tuesday's meeting will discuss plans for making that hope a reality."

Host of the meeting is the North Shore Committee for Study of Paths to Peace, organized and supported by representatives of some 50 North Shore voters', civic, church and veterans groups. Dr. Thompson is chairman of the "Paths to Peace" committee. Moderator of the UN Day forum will be Irving Pflaum, Chicago newspaper columnist.

A panel of speakers suggesting concrete ways the United Nations can act to establish world peace includes Jacob Logan Fox, Jr., attorney and general counsel for Illinois branch, United World Federalists; Dean Emery Y. Baldauf, Professor of Philosophy at Roosevelt College, representing Atlantic Union; James Eldridge, Midwest Director, American Association for the United Nations, and Rev. Gene Bartlett, First Baptist Church of Evanston, for the "Quaker" proposals to maintain peace.

The meeting will be called to order at 8:15.

Planners of the event are a program committee of the "Paths to Peace" organization, including Dr. Ernest Solomon, Highland Park and Winnetka.

PTA Associations To Present Dr. Furbay In Joint Meeting

Dr. John Harvey Furbay will be presented as the "first-choice" speaker by the Parent-Teachers Associations of the Highland Park High School and the ten elementary schools in the district on Thursday night, November 2nd, at 8:00 p.m. in the High School Auditorium. His talk, entitled "Global Minds In A Global World," has proved to be especially popular before the educators of our country. In discussing the increase in global travel and business, Dr. Furbay points out the necessity of our thinking catching up with the technological advances which the air world has achieved.

This will be the second annual joint program presented by the P.T.A. associations in the area. The plan was inaugurated last year to enable all of the parents and teachers to participate in a program of the quality which no one group could afford to present.

The program chairman of the eleven schools met in February at Ravinia school to determine whether or not to repeat a program similar to the Overstreet colloquy of last year. Each chairman brought word of their board's unanimous approval and their suggestions of possible worthy speakers.

Dr. John Harvey Furbay's name was presented by Mrs. Morton Livingston of the Elm Place P.T.A. He had been a speaker at the District 107 Workshop in August, 1949. Dr. C. A. Dahle had engaged him upon the recommendation of Mrs. D. J. Zimmerman, principal of Green Bay School, who heard him at the National College of Education in Evanston. It was reported at the program chairman's meeting that when Bannockburn School opened the week after Dr. Furbay's talk, the teachers were still so enthusiastic that they convinced the parents in order to tell them of our speaker.

Dr. Furbay, who was the first joint choice, is Director of Air World Education, Trans World Airlines, Inc., and Aviation Education Representative on UNESCO. He is an educator, scientist, explorer and author. Almost simultaneously with this local decision, Dr. Furbay was speaking to over ten thousand members at the convention of the American Association of School Administrators at Atlantic City. At the conclusion of his address, Dr. Furbay received a tremendous ovation and was called back to the platform for three curtain calls.

In May he addressed the National P.T.A. Convention in Long Beach, California. Mrs. Zimmerman, the first to hear Dr. Furbay, said "Dr. Furbay gave us a deep feeling of responsibility toward our young people in preparing them for the many contacts throughout the world in business as well as in pleasure. He stressed the need for them to know and appreciate the cultures and languages of the people with whom they will be dealing."

Dr. C. A. Dahle, superintendent of District 107, said "In excess of ten thousand superintendents present at the Atlantic City Convention were extremely enthusiastic about Dr. Furbay. He is a stimulating speaker. It is an experience no citizen will want to miss."

Dr. Scatliff, who is an interesting speaker, will give his audience the viewpoint of the experienced professional man in the field of medicine.

December Call For Induction

Colonel Paul G. Armstrong, Director of Selective Service for the State of Illinois, has announced that he has received the December call for induction of registrants in the State of Illinois.

A total of 2637 persons are called for induction during the month of December. This does not include any special call for doctors, dentists or veterinarians.

It is the intention of Colonel Armstrong to try to complete all of the inductions by December 15th, so as not to disrupt Christmas plans and other arrangements made for that season.
