Rudolph Ingerle, Highland Park Artist, Dies

Services were held Monday at the C. H. Jordan chapel, Chicago, for Rudolph Frank Ingerle, 71, well known artist, who died Friday in Highland Park hospital.

His paintings won acclaim and awards from all over the world. Landscapes of his favorite Smoky mountain country of North Carolina hang in art galleries all over the country.

Mr. Ingerle was born in Vienna, Austria, in 1879 of Moravian and Bohemian parents. While in his teens he came to Chicago and soon was enrolled at the Art Institute. Further education was received at Smith's academy where he helped to organize the Palette and Chisel club.

He came to Highland Park in 1922 and has since resided at 399 Laurel avenue. He was director of the Highland Park Public library where a picture which he called "Moonlight On Lake Michigan" hangs on the west wall.

"The Doctor", among his finest works, was exhibited at the Chicago World's Fair for two years and later displayed in cities throughout the United States and in London. Mr. Ingerle was the first president of the North Shore Art league and a director of the Municipal Art league. He belonged to many Chicago area art groups.

His works have been exhibited in almost all of the important national museums and a recent tally showed four gold awards, two silver awards, and 11 other major prizes for his paintings. Although he had a Chicago office most of his works were done in the attic studio of his home.

Surviving Mr. Ingerle are his wife, Marie, and a son, J. Norman Ingerle.

American Legion, Chicago Jaycees Back "Americans Will Vote"



Leaders on three levels, national, state and city met in Chicago to coordinate plans to get Americans to vote. George Craig, left, National Commander of The American Legion, pledged his support of the newly formed Americans Will Vote represented by Elmer Layden, right, president. Frank Moran, center, president of the Chicago Jr. Chamber of Commerce and Industry, told of the Jaycees' plans for "get out the vote in Chicago." Mr. Craig stopped off in Chicago to meet with these two civic leaders on his way to the American Legion Convention in Los Angeles. At that time, he will propose that the legionnaires adopt a resolution urging all Americans to exercise their right to vote. He stated, "While the American Legion has and will engage upon many objectives, each is an attempt to preserve for our government in time of peace, the principles for which we fought and our friends died in time of war. Americans will vote to prove to the other nations of the world that they have a tenacity to retain our form of government against all aggressors at all costs. Americans will vote to pledge continued loyalty to their fighting men who are dying in the field of Korea in the cause of freedom." Elmer Layden told of the extensive plans being carried out by Americans Will Vote in the State of Illinois to insure a maximum number of voting registrations and ballots cast at the polls November 7th. Frank Moran explained that on the city level the Jaycees intended to make parents and their friends responsible for their vote to grammar school students. It is expected that the combined efforts of these three organizations will help remove the public apathy with respect to voting.
