The nationwide success of these discussions in many communities and organizations has proved that everyone wants to know more about our business system. This series covers:

The Profit Angle, Who Profits From Profits?, Production Versus Buying Power, The Tools of Exchange, Where Does Our Money Come From?, What Is Behind Our Money?, When Business Is Promising, What Forces Control Prices?, What Forces Control Wages?, Problems of Today and Tomorrow, Applying Economic Principles, Plans, Plans, Plans, and Which Plans Are Best?

The series opened on Monday evening, October 23, at Elm Place School. The discussions are conducted by Mr. Connor B. Shaw, Assistant General Manager in the Procedures Office at Marshall Field & Company. Mr. Shaw was one of the instructors at Harvard last June when this program was given to graduates of the Harvard Business School.
