Christian Science Lecture

A Lecture on Christian Science Entitled Christian Science: Its Spiritual Idealism and Realism by George W. Martin, C.S.B. of Melbourne, Australia

Member of the Board of Lectureship of The Mother Church, The First Church of Christ, Scientist, in Boston, Massachusetts was delivered in the Church edifice on Friday evening, November 10.

The lecturer spoke substantially as follows:

Christian Science is grounded on the rock of ages, the omnipotence of God being the keystone of its teachings. These teachings therefore do not include a contention between God and a lesser power known to mankind as evil. By that statement, I would not have you think that Christian Scientists ignore the claim of evil to power and authority. Indeed they are wide-awake to the subtle methods by which evil would delude its victims into accepting its seeming power as real and formidable. These subtle methods, however, need cause you no further trepidation, because Christian Science proves beyond all question that a clear realization of God's omnipresence and omnipotence strips evil of its pretensions. Those students who demonstrate and preserve inviolate this realization are no longer slaves to the mesmeric belief in evil's power to delude and ensnare. However real the counterfeit claim appears to be, it is no more worthy of acceptance as real than a counterfeit coin.

God, being the one and only creator, there cannot be another cause. The great I AM includes all cause and effect. The divine cause being perfect, the effect must be harmonious. We shall awaken to the fact of the ever-presence of God's perfect kingdom, proportionally to our loyalty to those two great spiritual laws, the First Commandment and the Golden Rule.

Spiritual Idealism and Realism

The importance of the First Commandment and of the Golden Rule in the lives of students of Christian Science is summarized by Mary Baker Eddy, the Discoverer and Founder of this practical religion, in these unmistakable words: "The First Commandment of the Hebrew Decalogue, 'Thou shalt have no other gods before me,' and the Golden Rule are the all-in-all of Christian Science." She continues: "They are the spiritual idealism and realism which, when realized, constitute a Christian Scientist, heal the sick, reform the sinner, and rob the grave of its victory." Young Marrieds To Entertain Couples Club

Author, lecturer, and teacher, Anita Libman Lebeson, will be the guest speaker. Her subject is "Meet America's First Woman Historian."

Last spring the Congregational Church group was guest of the Congregation Israel's Couples Club. Harold Shane, noted educator, spoke at that meeting. A social period and refreshments will precede this meeting.

Mrs. Lebeson, a resident of Winnetka since 1928, is a distinguished historian in her own right. Her most recent book "Pilgrim People" was published last month. She will evaluate interfaith relations of early America through the eyes of a forgotten colonial historian, Hannah Adams, relative of presidents John Adams and John Quincy Adams. Hannah Adams had faded into oblivion until recent scholarly research by Mrs. Lebeson created new interest in her writings.

Mrs. Lebeson taught American history at the University of Illinois, where she earned her bachelors degree. She did post-graduate work at the University of Chicago and Northwestern University receiving her Master's degree in 1935. Among her varied interests are the Chicago Travelers Aid Society, of which she is an officer and director, the Women's Trade Union League of Chicago, and the Education Fund for War Foster Children.

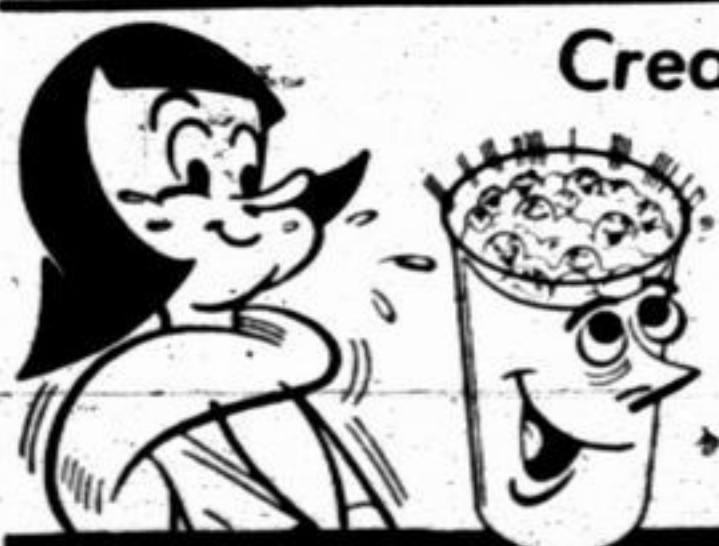

Girl Scouts Learn About "Girl Guides" Of Finland

An unexpected treat came last Monday for two girls from each Highland Park Girl Scout troop and for members of the Girl Scout council. A visitor from Finland, Mrs. Antje Tallgren, met with them at the Highland Park Community Center to tell them about the Girl Guides of Finland. She is visiting Mrs. C. Bouton McDougal, whom she met at the Chalet in Switzerland several years ago while Mrs. Tallgren was one of two Finnish delegates, and Mrs. McDougal, one of the four from the United States. Mrs. Tallgren is still working with an ex-leaders group of Guides, and Mrs. McDougal is a member of the Highland Park Girl Scout council.

Mrs. Tallgren told our Highland Park scouts how very similar are the Promise and Laws of the Finnish Guides to our own. Our meetings are similar, too, as are our system of patrols and ceremonies.

However, Finnish Guides spend more time than we do learning how to camp under rugged and primitive conditions, even in the winter time. She told them all about the Chalet—how the Juliette Low girls, selected from all countries, meet each year for their mutual understanding, and how they keep in touch with each other through an organization for continued exchange of friendship. She taught our Highland Park Scouts a song, "Var Redo", which means "Be Prepared," and every body sang the "Chalet Song."
