

However real the counterfeit claim appears to be, it is no more worthy of acceptance-as real than a counterfeit coin.

Mrs. Lebeson, a resident of Winnetka since 1928, is a distinguished historian in her own right. Her most recent book "Pilgrim People" was published last month, She will evaluate interfaith relations of early America through the eyes of a forgotten colonial historian, Hannah Adams, relative of presidents John Adams and John Quincy Adams. Hannah Adams had faded into oblivion until recent scholarly research by Mrs. Lebeson created new inter-

est in her writings. Mrs. Lebeson taught American history at the University of Illinois, where she earned her bachelors degree. She did post-graduate work at the University of Chicago and Northwestern University receiving her Master's degree in 1935. Among her varied interests are the Chicago Travelers Aid Society, of which she is an officer and director, the Women's Trade Union League of Chicago, and the Education Fund for War Foster Children.
