NOTICE

ORDINANCE NO. 50-9-75 BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY BOARD OF THE CITY OF HIGHWOOD:

Section 11 as amended of an ordinance entitled "An Ordinance providing for the licensing and regulation of bicycles, motor vehicles, and motor vehicles, and for the issuance of licenses therefor, and for the collection of fees therefor, and for the enforcement of the same," is hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 11: That an annual license for each year shall be paid to the City of Highwood by the licensees or operators of the following motor vehicles, and for the collection of fees therefor: (a) Bicycles, \$5.00; (b) Motor cycles, \$5.00; (c) Motor driven commercial vehicles and trucks having a load capacity of one ton or less, \$7.00; (d) Motor driven commercial vehicles and trucks having a load capacity of more than one ton, \$10.00; (e) Motor driven commercial vehicles and trucks having a load capacity of more than three tons, \$15.00; (f) Motor driven commercial vehicles and trucks having a load capacity of over three tons, \$25.00.

The license fees shall be used for the purpose of improving, repairing, or maintaining the streets and other public roads within the City provided that the actual cost of the collection of such fees and the disbursement thereof may be deducted from the total amount collected for the general corporate fund and provided further that 15 per cent of such license fees may be paid into the general corporate fund for the payment of the salaries and wages of policemen engaged in the duty of regulating traffic.

All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are expressly repealed.

affairs. Our textbook (Science and Health, page 67), will reveal to you, "that through spiritual ascendancy our Lord and Master healed the sick, raised the dead, and commanded even the winds and waves to obey him." This spiritual understanding may be cultivated today in individual consciousness. This fact is a fundamental point in the theology of Christian Science.

Was it not Jesus' knowledge of the truth that Life, being God, is eternal, therefore indestructible, that enabled him successfully to challenge death and defy the grave? Knowledge of Truth is the Christian Scientist's medicine. As Mrs. Eddy writes in her "Miscellaneous Writings" (page 268): "God's preparations for the sick are potions of His own qualities." This medicine is administered through prayer which causes the relinquishment of all fear and doubt as thought awakens to man's oneness with the divine nature and character.

Mary Baker Eddy

Most of the world's reformers have pioneered along some special line of humanitarian research.
