On December 28 the Highland Park high varsity cagers will go to Hinsdale, Ill. for the First Annual Christmas Tournament to be held in the host school's new gymnasium. The local team will play the Hinsdale "Red Devils" in the first round, the game starting at 7 p.m. and if they should emerge victorious they will return on Friday, Dec. 29 to tangle with the winner of the Downers Grove and Crystal Lake game at 7:15 p.m. If the boys play good enough ball they could well play in the semi December 30 against one of the on.
