COFFEE AND CREAM CAKE

Make your favorite plain cake mix recipe and then use:

COFFEE CREAM FILLING

- 6 tablespoons sugar
- 2 teaspoons soluble coffee
- 5 tablespoons flour
- 1 cup scalded milk
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1 egg yolk
- 1 teaspoon butter

Combine first 4 ingredients in a small pan. Stir in milk. Cook until thickened. Place over hot water, cook about 15 minutes.

COFFEE ICING

- 1 tablespoon butter
- 2 teaspoons soluble coffee
- 1 egg yolk
- 1/4 cups sifted confectioners' sugar
- 1/4 cups undiluted evaporated milk
- 2 teaspoons soluble coffee
- 1/2 cup hot water
- 1/2 cup sliced, toasted almonds

Mix butter and egg yolk. Add sifted confectioners' sugar which has been mixed with soluble coffee. Gradually add milk, beating all the while, until a smooth, creamy consistency is reached.

MARSHMALLOW SUPREME

Cut marshmallows in quarters and let them stand overnight in sherry. In top of a double-boiler, dissolve gelatin in cold water. Cook for 10 minutes, stirring constantly. Dissolve soluble coffee in hot water. Add to the milk mixture. Fold in marshmallows. Pour into one quart mold rinsed with cold water and chill. Unmold, garnish with whipped cream, cherries and almonds. Yield: 6-8 servings.
