


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The proverbial "Necessity is the Mother of Invention" philosophy has applied once again in the case of William R. Anderson, Orange, California. Because Mr. Anderson had to feed 13,000 hungry chickens daily, he invented a mobile feeding device he says helps him to do the job quickly and easily. It is a cart that runs on tracks between coops. The feed is manually scooped into a hopper which dispenses an equal amount of food to every chicken. The cart holds 400 pounds of feed and can unload 2,600 pounds per hour.

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
