Sunday School Teachers, Workers in Vacation Church Schools, Leaders in programs of Religious Education will have an opportunity to gain a better understanding of the children with whom they are working, obtain a fuller knowledge of the teaching-learning process, and develop their ability in specific teaching techniques. Pre-school: Mrs. Harold F. Pfister.

1st, 2nd, and 3rd Grades: Miss Diana Crawford.

4th, 5th, and 6th Grades: Mrs. Lester H. Laubenstein.

7th and 8th Grades: The Rev. Edward Greenfield.

In these sections there will be an opportunity to share problems and solutions and to apply the material presented by the Resource Leader to a particular age group and situation.

Each evening will close with the Resource Leader and the whole group reassembling to discuss reports from each of the four sections.

Veterans from North Shore towns will meet Tuesday to draft an "Outlaw War" proposal aimed at strengthening the United Nations into an effective peace enforcement agency.

"A North Shore-originated proposal will be presented to a national veterans convention in May when the American Veterans Committee will vote on adopting the policy," Prentiss Bryson, Evanston, chairman of the North Shore AVC chapter's policy committee, said.

Tuesday's meeting will take place at 8 p.m. at William Steel's home, 1493 Asbury, Winnetka, and is open to AVC members, other veterans and interested citizens.

Goal of the proposal will be to unite American support for the United Nations, world federalism and Atlantic Union behind immediate steps to protect democracy and reinforce UN's present setup, Bryson said.
