AN ORDINANCE AMENDING AN ORDINANCE ENTITLED "AN ORDINANCE DEFINING AND DECLARING CERTAIN THINGS TO BE NUISANCES, PROHIBITING AND PROVIDING FOR THE ABATEMENT OF THE SAME WITHIN THE CITY OF HIGHLAND PARK, PASSED AUGUST 28, 1944, APPROVED AUGUST 29, 1944."

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF HIGHLAND PARK, LAKE COUNTY, ILLINOIS:
SECTION I. That an ordinance entitled "An Ordinance Defining and Declaring Certain Things to be Nuisances, Prohibiting and Providing for the Abatement of the Same Within the City of Highland Park, Passed August 28, 1944, Approved August 29, 1944," be and the same is hereby amended by the following subsection, which shall be hereafter known and designated as subsection V of Section I of said ordinance:

V. It shall be unlawful and is hereby declared a nuisance that any person, firm or corporation shall, except for the purposes of the construction of a building or other structure, remove earth, fill or borrow from any premises within the City of Highland Park, so that, upon such removal, surface water or sewage will or might accumulate and remain so as to create or be likely to create a hazard or attraction to infants and others or so as to provide or make available a breeding place for mosquitoes and other insects.
The foregoing shall not be construed to prohibit the construction of swimming pools or reservoirs for water storage for use where sufficient mechanical or other drainage is supplied or where such removal is for the purposes of a construction or an adaptation of said premises to a special and specified use and where such removal is pursuant to the provisions of the ordinances of the City of Highland Park and permit issued therefor.

SECTION II. The within amending ordinance shall not be construed to repeal by implication any of the provisions contained in said original ordinance but shall be deemed to be cumulative, nor shall the provisions hereof be construed to repeal other existing ordinances of the City of Highland Park wherein certain nuisances are defined as an integral part of such ordinance or ordinances.

SECTION III. This amending ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its filing, passage, approval, recordation and publication, as provided by law.

AN ORDINANCE REGULATING THE INSTALLATION AND USE OF LIQUEFIED PETROLEUM GAS BURNING EQUIPMENT AND THE STORAGE AND USE OF LIQUEFIED PETROLEUM GAS USED THEREWITH AND FOR THE INSPECTION THEREOF.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF HIGHLAND PARK, LAKE COUNTY, ILLINOIS:

LEGAL

LAND PARK, LAKE COUNTY, ILLINOIS.
SECTION I. It shall be and is hereby declared unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to install or use a liquefied petroleum gas system or installation except in accordance with the provisions of this ordinance.
(1) The rules and regulations of the National Board of Fire Underwriters as contained in the pamphlet known as NFPA Pamphlet No. 58, Standard of the National Board of Fire Underwriters for the design, installation and construction of containers and pertinent equipment for the storage and handling of Liquefied Petroleum Gases as recommended by the National Fire Protection Association 1947 Edition, are hereby adopted by reference and the same shall constitute and be the laws of this City with reference to such installation, use and handling. Copies thereof shall remain in the office of the City Clerk at all times and shall be available for inspection.

(2) The following additional special rules and regulations are further hereby adopted, to-wit:

(a) Portable cylinder systems using Liquefied Petroleum Gas shall not be installed within the fire limits, nor shall any Liquefied Petroleum Gas system of any description be installed, maintained or operated within the fire limits except by special permit of the City Council upon showing that public safety will not thereby be prejudiced.

(b) The total number of gallons water capacity in any installation shall not exceed 550 gallons for any premises.

(c) Bulk plants or plants devoted to filling containers or warehouse facilities for the storage of containers are prohibited within the limits of the City of Highland Park.

SECTION II. Pursuant to the recommendation of the Committee appointed by the Mayor and approved by the City Council of the City of Highland Park, there are adopted hereby revised rules and regulations governing the issuance of permits by the Building Department, as follows, to-wit:

(1) Permits for the installation, alteration and use of Liquefied Petroleum Gas equipment shall be issued only on receipt of an application therefor, made out on forms furnished by the City of Highland Park and submitted to the Building Inspector after approval by the Fire Chief or his duly authorized representative and approved by the State Department of Public Safety, where required, and upon the payment of the fee in advance as hereinafter provided.

(2) The application for each such installation shall contain the name of the applicant, the person, firm or corporation proposing to install the same, the owner of the property, the user of the equipment to be installed, after which the location by street number, the legal description of the property upon which the installation is to be made, together with a complete description and scale drawing of the proposed installation.

SECTION III. The following are hereby adopted as fees and shall be required to be paid for the installation and inspection of all equipment installed or altered within the City of Highland Park, to-wit:

(1) For each application for permit for cylinder installation, there shall be a fee of \$2.00 for the installation of each cylinder and \$2.00 for the consumer appliance plus an additional \$1.00 for each additional consumer appliance over one.

(2) For each application for permit for underground tank installation, there shall be a fee of \$20.00 for each tank and \$2.00 for one consumer appliance plus \$1.00 for each additional consumer appliance over one.

(3) An annual inspection fee of \$20.00 payable at the beginning of each fiscal year after the installation date.

SECTION IV. It shall be the duty of the Building Inspector to enforce all the provisions of this ordinance, to make all inspections and issue all permits hereunder.

SECTION V. Any person, firm or corporation who shall neglect, refuse or violate or resist enforcement of any of the provisions of this ordinance more than \$200.00 for each violation, every such person, firm or corporation shall be deemed guilty of a separate offense for every day on which such neglect, refusal or violation shall continue.

SECTION VI. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in any manner in conflict herewith are hereby expressly repealed.

SECTION VII. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage, approval, recordation and publication, in accordance with law.

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING AN ORDINANCE ENTITLED "AN ORDINANCE CREATING A TRAFFIC COMMISSION AND ESTABLISHING TRAFFIC REGULATIONS FOR THE CITY OF HIGHLAND PARK, LAKE COUNTY, ILLINOIS, PASSED AND APPROVED MARCH 10, 1941" (AND AMENDING SCHEDULE I ATTACHED THERETO)

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF HIGHLAND PARK, LAKE COUNTY, ILLINOIS:
SECTION I. That Schedule I attached to and made a part of an ordinance entitled "An Ordinance Creating a Traffic Commission and Establishing Traffic Regulations for the City of Highland Park, Lake County, Illinois, Passed and Approved March 10, 1941," be and the same is hereby amended by adding thereto under the portion of such Schedule prohibiting parking at any time, as follows:
Upon both sides of Green Bay Road from the intersection of Green Bay Road and Central Avenue to the City North to the intersection of said Green Bay Road with Elm Place in the City.
Upon the east side of Second Street from the point of its intersection with Elm Place in the City North-erly to the intersection of said Second Street with Green Bay Road in the City.
Upon the north side of Park Avenue from the point of its intersection with Sheridan Road East to the intersection of Park Avenue with Linden Avenue in said City, and by adding to said Schedule under that portion prohibiting parking between certain hours, as follows:
Upon the South side of Park Avenue, beginning at a point 50 feet from its intersection with Sheridan Road in the City and continuing Easterly a distance of 42 feet, during the hours from 8 A.M. until 5 P.M. in each day.

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING AN ORDINANCE ENTITLED "AN ORDINANCE CREATING A TRAFFIC COMMISSION AND ESTABLISHING TRAFFIC REGULATIONS FOR THE CITY OF HIGHLAND PARK, LAKE COUNTY, ILLINOIS, PASSED AND APPROVED MARCH 10, 1941" (ADDING A SECTION TO SAID ORDINANCE NOW AND HERE-AFTER DESIGNATED AS SECTION 64.1)

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF HIGHLAND PARK, LAKE COUNTY, ILLINOIS:
SECTION I. That an ordinance entitled "An Ordinance Creating a Traffic Commission and Establishing Traffic Regulations for the City of Highland Park, Lake County, Illinois, Passed and Approved March 10, 1941" be and the same is hereby amended by adding thereto the following section, which shall be hereafter known and cited as Section 64.1 of said ordinance:

Section 64.1. No person shall stop, stand or park a vehicle for any purpose or period of time in excess of 15 minutes, excepting in any place marked as a taxicab stand or public loading platform, during the hours from 8 A. M. until 6 A. M. upon any day during the months of December, January, February and March of each year.

SECTION II. The provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed to be cumulative and shall not be construed to repeal but shall be supplementary to all other provisions of the ordinance heretofore relating to stopping, standing and parking of motor vehicles.

SECTION III. This amending ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage, approval, recordation and publication, as required by law.
