The bride was given in marriage by her brother, Whitt Northmore Schultz. The Rev. Charles U. Harris heard the exchange of nuptial vows. The bride is the daughter of Mrs. Whitt Schultz of 1007 Ridgewood place and the bridegroom is the son of the junior Hubbells of Glenview.

The bride's white satin gown was trimmed with buttons down the front and her veil of French lace, purchased on her trip to Europe last year, was topped by a cap headdress. Amazon lilies were attached to the white leather prayer book which she carried.

Matron of honor was the bride's sister, Mrs. William E. Child Psychiatrist Will Speak At Public Library, Feb. 12

Dr. Irene Josselyn, psychiatrist and consultant for Highland Park Family Service, will speak in the Public Library Auditorium at 8:00 p.m. February 12th on the subject, "Understanding Children".
