### "Y" Offers Spring Classes In Spanish And Bible Study


The Y.W.C.A. committee on adult education are to be complimented for their efforts in securing two well known educators who will conduct classes in Spanish and Bible Study.



"The state law provides that, 'the council shall have the power, by ordinance from time to time, to create, fill and discontinue offices and employments other than herein described, according to their Judgment of the needs of the city or village'. The position of City Manager may be created under this authority."
