Actually, there have been a few good stories of this genre in every century since Shakespeare. Science fiction might be defined as fiction which concerns itself with imaginary discoveries based on acceptable scientific fact or theory, and which usually attempts to predict the effect of such an invention on mankind, past, present, or fu-

Science fiction usually falls into these categories: prophecy stories, in which the author tries to predict the effects of a new invention; philosophical stories, which the author presents, in story form, some philosophical question, using the medium of science fiction simply to set the stage for the particular point he wants to discuss; and adventure science fiction, wherein the action and plot are the main point.

Several anthologies which have appeared in recent years serve as the best introduction to the genre by presenting the cream of the science stories since about 1925. Among these are "Best Science Fiction Stories, 1950;" Groff Conklin's "A Treasury of Science Fiction:" August Derleth's "The Other Side of the Moon, and Against the Stars," by Martin Greenberg: R. Healy's "Adventures in Time and Space;" and Leo Margulies' "My Best Science


