mark the arrival of the millionth visitor, Lester Dill, owner of the 26-mile-long caves on Route 66, some 60 miles from St. Louis, presented a giant-sized gold key to beautiful Mary Kay

Stock of St. Louis. Dill, who several months ago, applied for an RFC loan to equip the caves as a bomb refuge, opened Meramec Caverns to the public in 1933. He said that attendance has swelled since American forces entered the Korean war and that most of the

visitors in the past several weeks have been reager for information about the use of the caves as a refuge against bombs.

At the time he applied for an RFC loan, Dill explained the caves could provide haven for thousands of persons over a long period, that the Lost River which flows through the caves would give sufficient water supply for the caves' refugees as well as for

hydro-electric power. . Recently, Dr. J. Harlan Bretz, professor of geology at the University of Chicago, headed a group of geologists who made a survey of Meramec Caverns, He declared that the structure, formation and facilities of the caves would give good protection against bombings.
