

Y., Feb. 7th-An untapped reservoir of defense manpower, amounting to at least 500,000,000 work hours annually, can be made available through the utilization of the remaining abilities of our country's some 250,000 unemployed disabled veterans, according to an estimate made today by Kenneth C. Bradley, National Director of Employment of the Disabled American Veterans.

"Trained disabled veterans can handle many jobs from which industrial workers can be released to perform heavier tasks," Bradley explained.
