AN ORDINANCE AMENDING AN OR-DINANCE ENTITLED "AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR THE CONSTRUC-MANTELING OF TEMPORARY SHEDS OR SHELTERS (AND AMENDMENT AND ADDITION TO ARTICLE 23 OF THE HIGHLAND PARK CITY CODE)." PASSED APRIL 2, 1945, AND APPROVED

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF HIGH-LAND PARK, LAKE COUNTY, ILLI-

SECTION I. That Sections V and VI of an ordinance entitled "An Ordinance Providing for the Construction, Maintenance and Dismantling of Tempor-ary Sheds or Shelters (An Amendment and Addition to Aritcle 23 of the Highland Park City Code)", passed April 2, 1945, and approved April 3, 1945, be and the same are hereby repealed and in lieu thereof the following sections in amendment of said ordinance are hereby adopted, which sections shall hereafter be known and cited as Sections v and VI, respectively, of said ordinance:

Section V. Permits provided to be issued hereunder for the construction or maintenance of temporary sheds or shelters shall be conditioned and limited as follows:

A. No such temporary shed or shelter shall be constructed, used or maintained for the storage or shelter of volatile and inflammable liquids, gases, explosives or other materials likely to increase the hazard to public health, welfare and safety.

B. No permit shall be granted hereunder for nor shall any such temporary shed or shelter be constructed to exceed 12 feet in height, nor 1000 sq. ft. in floor area.

C. Where any temporary shed or shelter shall have been heretofore erected, either pursuant to permit been in existence and maintained for land Park from and after 2 o'clock a period longer than one year at the date of the adoption of this ordinance, then the same shall be demolished and Notice is further given hereby removed within one year from this sum provided to be deposited by Section get and appropriation ordinance IV of the ordinance of which this is the City and provided that the licensee or shelter shall be forthwith demolished dress. and removed by the person maintaining the same, or if he or it shall fail to do so, then the same shall be demolished and removed by the City. Section VI. Any person, firm corporation desiring to construct and maintain any temporary shed or shelter shall upon application therefor pay a license fee to the City in the amount of \$100.00, which license fee shall be exclusive of and in addition to the indemnity and sum provided to be de-posited by Section IV of the ordinance of which this is an amendment. SECTION II. All ordinances or parts

of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby expressly repealed. 


