Notice is hereby given that a public hearing will be held in the Council Chamber in the City Hall in the City of Highland Park, Illinois, on Tuesday, the 13th day of March, 1951, at 8:00 P. M. Said public hearing will be conducted by the undersigned, the Zoning Committee for the City of Highland Park, designated and appointed by the Mayor and City Council of the City of Highland Park for that purpose, to consider the amendment of the regulations imposed and the districts created by the Highland Park Zoning Ordinance of 1947 in the following respects:

1. To rezone from "D" One-Sixth Acre Single Family Dwelling District to "H" Central Business District, the following described property:
Lot 2 in Ravinia Station Subdivision of Lots 157 158 and 159 of South Highland Addition in Section 36, Township 42 North, Range 12, East of the 3rd Principal Meridian, according to the plat thereof, recorded January 3, 1924, as Document 234294, in Lake County, Illinois.
2. To rezone from "F" Multiple Family Dwelling District to "H" Central Business District, the following described property:
Lots 7 and 8, Block 9, City of Highland Park.
3. To rezone from "C" Twelve Thousand and Square Foot Single Family Dwelling District to "G" Outlying Business District, the following described property:
Lot Eleven (11) in Block Six (6) in Northwood Manor, being a subdivision of part of the South East Quarter (SE¹/₄) of Section Thirty-six (36), Township Forty-three (43) North, Range Twelve (12), East of the Third Principal Meridian, according to the plat thereof, recorded July 2, 1923 in Book "L" of plats, Page 94 as Document No. 235218, in Lake County, Illinois.
4. To rezone from "F" Multiple Family Dwelling District to "H" Central Business District, the following described property:
Lots 1, 2, 3 and 4, Block 13, Excelsior Addition.
5. To amend Section 3-3 by changing the definition of "lot of record."
6. To amend Section 3-38 to incorporate a definition of an "officially approved place."
7. To amend Section 3-51 by changing the method of measuring the width and depth of yards.
8. To amend Section 3-14(a) and to add a new section to be known as Section 5-15 to provide yard requirements for certain small lots of record.
9. To amend Sections 6-14(a), 7-13 (a) and 8-6(a) to provide for fixed front yard requirements.
10. To amend Sections 6-14(c), 7-13 (c) and 8-6(c) to insure a minimum yard requirement on corner lots.
11. To amend Section 7-15 to correct a typographical error.
12. To amend Section 10-8 and to add a new section to be designated Section 14-10.01 to provide for the location of convalescent homes and nursing homes.
13. To amend Section 12-18 and to add a new section to be designated Section 16-19 to provide for an adjustment of front yard requirements in certain unusual circumstances.
14. To add a new section to be designated as Section 14-10.02 to provide for the location of nursery schools and play schools.
15. To amend Section 14-2 to limit the change of nonconforming uses.
16. To amend Section 14-5 to limit the extension or expansion of nonconforming uses.
17. To add a new section to be known as Section 14-24 to provide for the payment of a filing fee in connection with applications for special permits.
18. To amend Section 16-3 so that it will be consistent with other sections of the ordinance insofar as the number of stories permitted.
19. To change the regulation of fences.
20. To amend Section 16-17 to permit the use of kitchens in the basements of churches, clubs, restaurants, etc.

At the said public hearing and at any adjournment thereof an opportunity will be afforded to all persons interested in the matters above mentioned to be heard in relation to said matter.

LEGAL

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING AN ORDINANCE ENTITLED "AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR THE CONSTRUCTION, MAINTENANCE AND DEMANTLING OF TEMPORARY SHEDS OR SHELTERS (AND AMENDMENT AND ADDITION TO ARTICLE 23 OF THE HIGHLAND PARK CITY CODE)," PASSED APRIL 2, 1945, AND APPROVED APRIL 3, 1945.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF HIGHLAND PARK, LAKE COUNTY, ILLINOIS:

SECTION I. That Sections V and VI of an ordinance entitled "An Ordinance Providing for the Construction, Maintenance and Demantling of Temporary Sheds or Shelters (An Amendment and Addition to Article 23 of the Highland Park City Code)," passed April 2, 1945, and approved April 3, 1945, be and the same are hereby repealed and in lieu thereof the following sections in amendment of said ordinance are hereby adopted, which sections shall hereafter be known and cited as Sections V and VI, respectively, of said ordinance:

Section V. Permits provided to be issued hereunder for the construction or maintenance of temporary sheds or shelters shall be conditioned and limited as follows:

A. No such temporary shed or shelter shall be constructed, used or maintained for the storage of flammable, volatile and inflammable liquids, gases, explosives or other materials likely to increase the hazard to public health, welfare and safety.

B. No permit shall be granted hereunder for nor shall any such temporary shed or shelter be constructed to exceed 12 feet in height, nor 1000 sq. ft. in floor area.

C. Where any temporary shed or shelter shall have been heretofore erected, either pursuant to permit granted or otherwise, and shall have been in existence and maintained for a period longer than one year at the date of the adoption of this ordinance, then the same shall be demolished and removed within one year from this date, provided that the indemnity and sum provided to be deposited by Section IV of the ordinance of which this is an amendment shall be deposited with the City and provided that the licensee or firm or corporation maintaining such temporary shed or shelter shall pay the same indemnity and sum or to pay such license fee, then such temporary shed or shelter shall be forthwith demolished and removed by the person maintaining the same, or if he or it shall fail to do so, then the same shall be demolished and removed by the City.

SECTION VI. Any person, firm or corporation desiring to construct and maintain any temporary shed or shelter shall upon application therefor pay a license fee to the City in the amount of \$10.00, which license fee shall be exclusive of and in addition to the indemnity and sum provided to be deposited by Section IV of the ordinance of which this is an amendment.

SECTION VII. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby expressly repealed. The within amending ordinance shall be indexed and hereafter referred to, together with the original ordinance of which this is an amendment as Section A-4 of Article 23 of the Highland Park City Code.

SECTION III. This amending ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage, approval, recordation and publication, as provided by law.
