Rep. McClory Halts "Anti-U.N." Resolve

An Illinois legislature resolution urging that the United States quit the United Nations ran into a road block last week when Lake Bluff's Rep. Robert McClory moved to pigeonhole it.

McClory, as a member of the House Executive Committee, had previously voted with a majority who approved the bill 4-3 with 7 abstentions. After North Shore groups interested in foreign affairs criticized the bill as "isolationist propaganda," McClory moved to reconsider it and a thumping 13-2 majority of his committee sent it to a subcommittee for "study."

"Most of the Assembly are opposed to the present course of foreign events," McClory told members of the American Veterans Committee after the voting. "But this bill, H.R. 20, in its present shape, did not accurately express their views."

North Shore civic leaders, members of local Leagues of Women Voters and the American Association for the United Nations, North Shore and Lake Forest chapters of United World Federalists, and the North Shore AVC joined in condemning the proposal as "likely to give aid and comfort to the enemies of democracy."

United Evangelical Church Lists Recent Improvements

"The effectiveness of the ministry of the church in a community is measured to a great extent by the readiness of its people to so give, and to so live, that the message of Christianity may be implanted in the most prepared and fertile of soils possible. To this end, the authoritative voice of the Christian message must be sounded in the most congenial of atmospheres, amid surroundings which of themselves induce a spirit of reverential worship." So said the Rev. A. G. Masser, pastor of the First United Evangelical Church in a recent address commending his people upon their achievements during the past several years. Numerous improvements have been made to the church property, including the recently completed redecoration of the church auditorium.

Beginning with the installation three years ago of a complete system of organ and tower chimes (which are heard over a wide area each evening at six), the church launched a program of improvements which to date have included complete insulation of the entire building, installation of new lighting systems both in the Sunday School rooms and the church auditorium and complete redecoration of the entire interior.

With the completion of the interior phase of its improvement program the church plans to conduct appropriate services of rededication in connection with the Morning Worship Service on Sunday, March 4th. The Litany of Rededication will be read by the congregation and the pastor; the choir has prepared special anthems and the pastor will speak on the subject, "What Does Christ Expect of His Church?"

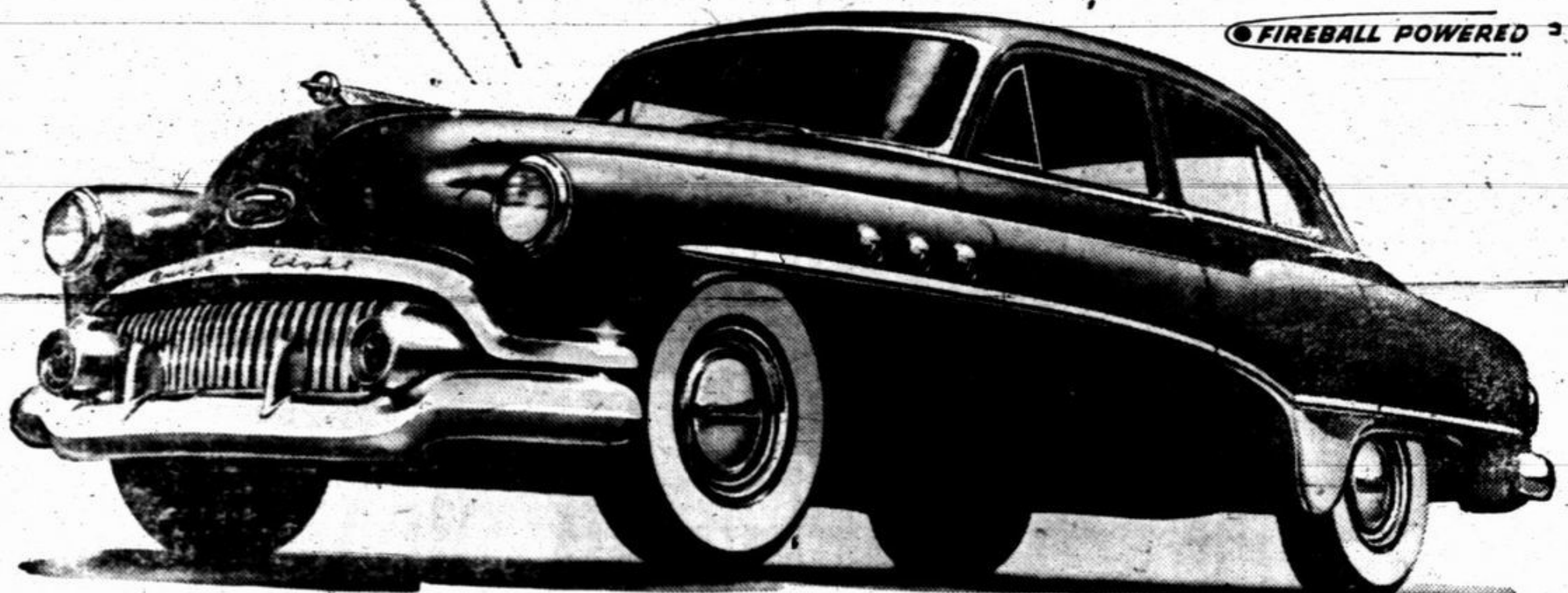
