Wins A Lawsuit But Can't Get His Home

Judge Ralph J. Dady in Circuit Court, Waukegan, recently up-

held the right of Edwin Wolf, Deerfield, to build a prefab home in a two-year long suit brought by Percy Wilson and Company.

But Wolf won't get the prefab.

He found that Gunnison Homes, maker of the disputed house, no longer manufactures the type which Dady approved. And Lake County Homes, the original builders, has quit handling the Gunnison product. To cap the issue, Building Commissioner Walter Krol of Deerfield while the suit was pending took matters into his own hands by cancelling the permit with which Wolf had started construction.

Filing of the Wilson suit in October, 1948 was the opening gun of a lively battle between conventional style constructors and prefab erectors in the village. Soon after the Wilson move, F. B. Friedstedt, a contractor, unsuccessfully tried to enjoin a factory built house near his own residence in Woodland Park. Later the Tackett Construction Company halted a similar house in their Briarwoods development, aided by a village Board of Appeals ruling which drew angry charges of falsified testimony from the prefab faction.

Despite Wolf's latest win in court, builders of conventionally constructed houses this week appeared to have the Deerfield building scene to themselves. The Wolf family, with two children, was reportedly looking for a homesite outside the village limits.
