In addition to the above are books on personal finance applicable to everyone, "Moneywise" provides intelligent women who have money to manage with essential information about handling it. D. F. Jordan writes "On Investments" from the point of view of a man who manages his own, gives advice on sources of information, and tells how to read the financial page. Another group of books which tell you how to plan a budget and keep it are Lasser's "How to live within your income;" Elsie Stapleton's "Spending for happiness," and "How to Lay a Nest Egg," by Edgar Scott.
