Bradley University officials announced recently that Syracuse University has accepted a bid to the National Campus Basketball Tournament which will be held in Peoria, March 27, 28, 30 and 31.

In the latter, they forced both Bradley and Kentucky all out before conceding defeat. They led the Wildcats most of the way and only a last period surge gave Kentucky the nod.

This brings the tournament field to five schools, and it is expected that more bids will be given sometime this week. Already in the fold are Utah, Wyoming, Bradley, Toledo, and Syracuse.
