Girl Scout News

Girl Scout badges are planned to help the troops in their programs of learning to work together to make themselves, their homes, and their community as much better as possible.
Some troops could accomplish this by doing no special badges at all—only having fun together while carefully living up to their promise and laws. Other troops like the feeling of step-by-step accomplishment which they get from earning badges.
It is foolish to compare the number of badges one troop earns with those of another troop. All girls and leaders are different, and some have more time to give to badge work while carrying on other troop activities. The important thing is to make sure that each badge is really earned so that it can be worn with pride.
If a girl works on a badge all by herself, she is likely to choose one she already knows about and so learn nothing new, even though she can pass the actual requirements. The small satisfaction received is not as much as the real pleasure she would receive by working together with her troop-mates on the badge. This way they learn from each other, they help each other, and they have fun with each other as they work and share. If a girl is already an expert in some special field, she can help others with her knowledge, and make sure that she, herself, learns even more than she already knew.
The test of doing a badge properly comes when a girl can feel this self-improvement, and, in addition, knows she has helped her troop, her home, her school and her community while earning it.

Income Tax Facts
John T. Jarecki, Collector of Internal Revenue for the First District of Illinois, announced recently that his office expected to complete the mailing of refund checks in connection with overpayments of 1950 income tax elected for refund by individuals, not later than June 30, 1951.
Collector Jarecki asked that taxpayers refrain from sending letters, telephoning or coming to the Collector's office in connection with expected refunds on income tax for 1950 until July 2, 1951. In this way taxpayers will assist in expediting the refunding program.
The Collector also stated that if taxpayers will cooperate in the manner requested that he was certain that very few people will find it necessary to contact his office after June 30, 1951, regarding their failure to receive refunds shown to be due them on their income tax returns for the calendar year 1950.
